Aid localization is a set of internal reforms, actions, and behavior changes that are being undertaken to ensure that the work puts local actors in the lead, strengthens local systems, and is responsive to local communities.

Data Collection







Interviewed 37 Humanitarian Engineering Practitioners



Qualitative coding

- Deductively coded into different themes like Aid Localization, Sectoral change, Career
- Main themes were further inductively coded into community focus, organizational/policy focus, benefits, and challenges. (work in progress)



Example:

"I think [aid] localization is inevitable and necessary. I think that it's going to be. I mean, if development is ever going to be sustainable and if we're actually going to do what we say we want to do in kind of handing this off at some point, but it's going to require us shifting that decision-making power over to the [local] people."

100% of participants believe that Aid Localization is good



"I'll say, yes, I think it's a good move. It's a good move to direct resources to the locals so that the problem can be solved [at a local level]."

"I'm in **support of aid localization** and I think that's a **more effective** way to use resources."

I think it's a good thing, in the sense that, it's bringing making the decision to those who are closest to the issues and who probably understand the issues the best.

A significant transformation will occur within the HE sector from aid localization.

Budget distribution

"It's interesting because, you know, USAID is pushing a lot. They have I think, their goal is 20 or 25% [of annual budget] in the next few years."



Programma tic changes


"We have really decentralized programing. Our country offices own their strategies. Not all of our country programs are led by locals, but most are. And we do a lot of our planning through kind of local structures. And I mean, we [headquarters] are more or less what I call like a systems facilitator."

Leadership changes

"You know, again, like I was saying, you have a lot of **nonprofit organizations switching to local leadership**, which has been big, even a lot more. Even so, for example, we have much more of our advisors that are just like head office with advisors there throughout the world. They're like regional advisors, and I think that's a really good step in that direction."

Career opportunities for Humanitarian Engineers will change.

Different skillsets


"I think that there's going to be more **regional-based positions and more positions open to locals**."

"We don't have a category like 25% that [recruits] we're trying to meet, but we're trying to push that when the work is being done to select a general contractor, which would likely be an Alaska company, but maybe not a local construction company, focus on **hiring some percentage** [of locals], 10% of the local population to work on the project."

"Those individuals internationally are going to have to start to specialize a bit more in terms of regions or countries where certainly we've seen more mobility of those expat staff across countries. So I think, you know, language skills where there's more of an awareness of working across those specific cultural boundaries, I think, is something that will become increasingly important."

Career opportunities for Humanitarian Engineers will change





"I think that will definitely change the way international agencies approach this because I think there won't be as many opportunities for people from the higher income countries to work on these projects."

"I think one of the biggest **misconceptions** that I see is that a lot of people think about localization as removing those international positions, and I don't think that that's actually going to happen.

Discussion and Future Work

- Many acknowledged the importance of aid localization.
- Practitioners believes that aid localization efforts will bring changes in the humanitarian engineering sector.
- Consecutively, career choices will be impacted due to the sectoral change.

- The extent of practitioners' knowledge and the influence of aid localization vary based on their respective professional backgrounds.
 - HE in international development
 - HE in community development (US)
 - HE in humanitarian/crisis response
