

Linear instability of Z-pinch in plasma: Viscous case

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The z-pinch is a classical steady state for the MHD model, where a confined plasma fluid is separated by vacuum, in the presence of a magnetic field which is generated by a prescribed current along the z-direction. We develop a scaled variational framework to study its stability in the presence of viscosity effect, and demonstrate that any such z-pinch is always unstable. We also establish the existence of a largest growing mode, which dominates the linear growth of the linear MHD system.

Keywords: Compressible MHD system; z-pinch plasma; vacuum; linear instability; viscosity.

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1. Introduction

1.1. Formulation of the problem in Eulerian coordinates

In this paper, we are concerned with the plasma-vacuum MHD system, where the plasma is confined inside a rigid wall and isolated from it by a region of low enough density to be treated as a “vacuum”. This model describes confined plasmas in a closed vessel, but separated from the wall by a vacuum region. We consider the cylindrical domain $\{(x_1, x_2, z) \in \mathbb{R}^2 \times 2\pi\mathbb{T} | x_1^2 + x_2^2 \leq r_w^2\}$, which is meant to model the container holding the plasma and the container divides into two disjoint pieces, $\Omega(t) = \{\rho(t) > 0\}$ and $\Omega^v(t) = \{\rho(t) = 0\}$, with the free boundary $\Sigma_{t,pv} = \overline{\Omega(t)} \cap \overline{\Omega^v(t)}$ and the perfectly conducting wall Σ_w on the outside r_w . For smooth solutions, the compressible MHD system in the plasma region can be written in Euler coordinates as

$$\begin{cases} \partial_t \rho + (u \cdot \nabla) \rho + \rho \nabla \cdot u = 0 & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \rho(\partial_t u + (u \cdot \nabla) u) + \nabla \left(p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 \right) - \nabla \cdot \mathbb{S}(u) = (B \cdot \nabla) B & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \partial_t B - \nabla \times (u \times B) = 0 & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \nabla \cdot B = 0 & \text{in } \Omega(t), \end{cases} \quad (1.1)$$

where the vector-field $u = (u_1, u_2, u_3)$ denotes the Eulerian plasma velocity field, ρ denotes the density of the fluid, $B = (B_1, B_2, B_3)$ is magnetic field, and p denotes the pressure function. The above system (1.1) is called compressible MHD equations which describe the motion of a perfectly conducting fluid interacting with a magnetic field. Here, the open, bounded subset $\Omega(t) \subset \mathbb{R}^3$ denotes the changing volume occupied by the plasma with $\rho(t) > 0$ in $\Omega(t)$. The strain tensor $\mathbb{D}(u)$ is defined as twice the symmetric part of the gradient of the velocity u , that is, $\mathbb{D}(u) = \nabla u + \nabla u^T$, with $\nabla \cdot u$ the rate of expansion of the plasma. The deviatoric (trace-free) part of the strain tensor $\mathbb{D}(u)$ is then $\mathbb{D}^0(u) = \mathbb{D}(u) - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} u \mathbb{I}$, where $\mathbb{I}$ is the identity matrix. The viscous stress tensor in fluid is then given by $\mathbb{S}(u) = \varepsilon \mathbb{D}^0(u) + \delta \operatorname{div} u \mathbb{I}$, where dynamic viscosity ε and bulk viscosity δ are constants. We have here considered the polytropic gases, the constitutive relation, which is also called the equation of state, and is given by $p = A \rho^\gamma$, where A is an entropy constant and $\gamma > 1$ is the adiabatic gas exponent. From the mass conservation equation in (1.1) and pressure satisfying γ law, one can get that

$$\partial_t p + u \cdot \nabla p + \gamma p \nabla \cdot u = 0. \quad (1.2)$$

In the vacuum domain $\Omega^v(t)$, we have the div-curl system

$$\begin{cases} \nabla \cdot \widehat{B} = 0 & \text{in } \Omega^v(t), \\ \nabla \times \widehat{B} = 0 & \text{in } \Omega^v(t) \end{cases} \quad (1.3)$$

which describes the vacuum magnetic field $\widehat{B}$. Here, we consider so-called pre-Maxwell dynamics. That is, as usual in nonrelativistic MHD, we neglect the

displacement current $\frac{1}{c^2} \partial_t \hat{E}$, where c is the speed of the light and $\hat{E}$ is the electric field. In general, quantities with a hat $\hat{\cdot}$ denote vacuum variables.

We assume that the plasma region $\Omega(t)$ is isolated from the fixed perfectly conducting wall Σ_w by a vacuum region $\Omega^v(t)$, which makes the plasma surface free to move. Hence, this model is a free boundary problem of the combined plasma-vacuum system. To solve this system, we need to prescribe appropriate boundary conditions. On the perfectly conducting wall Σ_w , the normal component of the magnetic field must vanish:

$$n \cdot \hat{B}|_{\Sigma_w} = 0, \quad (1.4)$$

where n is the outer unit normal to the boundary of Σ_w .

We prescribe the following jump conditions on the free boundary to connect the magnetic fields across the surface. These arise from the divergence B equation, and the momentum equations:

$$\begin{cases} n \cdot B = n \cdot \hat{B} & \text{on } \Sigma_{t,pv}, \\ \left[\left[p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 \right] \right] n - \mathbb{S}(u)n = 0 & \text{on } \Sigma_{t,pv}, \end{cases} \quad (1.5)$$

where $[[q]]_{\Sigma_{t,pv}}$ denotes $\hat{q} - q$ on the free boundary $\Sigma_{t,pv}$, and n is the outer normal to the boundary of $\Omega(t)$.

In conclusion, denote $\mathcal{V}(\Sigma_{t,pv})$ as the normal velocity of the free surface $\Sigma_{t,pv}$, the plasma-vacuum compressible MHD system can be written in Eulerian coordinates as

$$\begin{cases} \partial_t \rho + \nabla \cdot (\rho u) = 0 & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \rho(\partial_t u + (u \cdot \nabla)u) + \nabla \left(p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 \right) - \nabla \cdot \mathbb{S}(u) = (B \cdot \nabla)B & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \partial_t B - \nabla \times (u \times B) = 0, \quad \nabla \cdot B = 0 & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \nabla \cdot B = 0 & \text{in } \Omega(t), \\ \nabla \cdot \hat{B} = 0, \quad \nabla \times \hat{B} = 0 & \text{in } \Omega^v(t), \\ \mathcal{V}(\Sigma_{t,pv}) = u \cdot n & \text{on } \Sigma_{t,pv}, \\ n \cdot B = n \cdot \hat{B} & \text{on } \Sigma_{t,pv}, \\ \left(p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 - \frac{1}{2} |\hat{B}|^2 \right) n - \mathbb{S}(u)n = 0 & \text{on } \Sigma_{t,pv}, \\ n \cdot \hat{B}|_{\Sigma_w} = 0, \quad \rho|_{t=0} = \rho_0, \quad u|_{t=0} = u_0, \quad B|_{t=0} = B_0. \end{cases} \quad (1.6)$$

1.2. Background

The z -pinch instability in plasma for the compressible MHD system with vacuum and free boundary is an interesting and long-time open problem since the pinch experiments of the 1960s and 1970s, see Refs. [12] and [13] and the references therein.

There are many numerical simulations^[34] Up to now, there is no rigorous mathematical proof for viscous compressible MHD equations (1.6).

Note that Guo–Tice^[78] proved the linear Rayleigh–Taylor instability for inviscid and viscous compressible fluids by introducing a new variational method. Later on, using variational method, many authors considered the effects of magnetic field in the fluid equations. Jiang–Jiang^[9] considered the magnetic inhibition theory in non-resistive incompressible MHD fluids. Jiang–Jiang^[10] considered the nonlinear stability and instability in the Rayleigh–Taylor problem of compressible MHD equations without vacuum and established the stability/instability criteria for the stratified compressible magnetic Rayleigh–Taylor problem in Lagrangian coordinates. Jiang–Jiang^[11] investigated the stability and instability of the Parker problem for the three-dimensional compressible isentropic viscous magnetohydrodynamic system with zero resistivity in the presence of a modified gravitational force in a vertical strip domain in which the velocity of the fluid is non-slip on the boundary. Wang–Xin^[13] proved the global well-posedness of the inviscid and resistive problem with surface tension around a non-horizontal uniform magnetic field for the incompressible MHD equations. Wang^[14] got sharp nonlinear stability criterion of viscous incompressible non-resistive MHD internal waves in 3D. Gu^[6] considered the Cauchy problem of the two-dimensional incompressible magnetohydrodynamics system with inhomogeneous density and electrical conductivity and has showed the global well-posedness for a generic family of the variations of the initial data and an inhomogeneous electrical conductivity. All these results do not contain vacuum. For presenting vacuum, under the Taylor sign condition of the total pressure on the free surface, Gu–Wang^[5] proved the local well-posedness of the ideal incompressible MHD equations in Sobolev spaces. Recently, Bian–Guo–Tice^[1] have established any z -pinch linear instability for the ideal compressible MHD equations (1.6) with $\varepsilon = \delta = 0$ and containing vacuum. In this paper, we will rigorously prove z -pinch linear instability for system (1.6) with vacuum.

2. Steady State and Main Results

2.1. Derivation of the MHD system in Lagrangian coordinates

In this subsection, we mainly introduce the Lagrangian coordinates in which the free boundary becomes fixed.

First, we assume the equilibrium domains are given by

$$\begin{aligned}\overline{\Omega} &= \{(r, \theta, z) | r < r_0, \theta \in [0, 2\pi], z \in 2\pi\mathbb{T}\}, \\ \overline{\Omega}^v &= \{(r, \theta, z) | r_0 < r < r_w, \theta \in [0, 2\pi], z \in 2\pi\mathbb{T}\}.\end{aligned}$$

Here, the constant r_0 is the interface boundary and the constant r_w is the perfectly conducting wall position. This is meant to be a simplified model of the toroidal geometry employed in tokamaks.

Now, we introduce the Lagrangian coordinates.

(1) The flow map

Let $h(t, \mathcal{X})$ be a position of the gas particle $\mathcal{X}$ in the equilibrium domain $\overline{\Omega}$ at time t so that

$$\begin{cases} \frac{d}{dt}h(t, \mathcal{X}) = u(t, h(t, \mathcal{X})), & t > 0, \mathcal{X} \in \overline{\Omega}, \\ h|_{t=0} = \mathcal{X} + g_0(\mathcal{X}), & \mathcal{X} \in \overline{\Omega}. \end{cases} \quad (2.1)$$

Then the displacement $g(t, \mathcal{X}) = h(t, \mathcal{X}) - \mathcal{X}$ satisfies

$$\begin{cases} \frac{d}{dt}g(t, \mathcal{X}) = u(t, \mathcal{X} + g(t, \mathcal{X})), \\ g|_{t=0} = g_0. \end{cases} \quad (2.2)$$

We define the Lagrangian quantities in the plasma as follows (where $\mathcal{X} = (x, y, z) \in \overline{\Omega}$):

$$\begin{aligned} f(t, \mathcal{X}) &= \rho(t, h(t, \mathcal{X})), & v(t, \mathcal{X}) &= u(t, h(t, \mathcal{X})), & q(t, \mathcal{X}) &= p(t, h(t, \mathcal{X})), \\ b(t, \mathcal{X}) &= B(t, h(t, \mathcal{X})), & \mathcal{A} &= (Dh)^{-1}, & J &= \det(Dh). \end{aligned}$$

According to definitions of the flow map h and the displacement g , for $(i, j, k) \in \{1, 2, 3\}$ one can get the following identities:

$$\mathcal{A}_i^k \partial_k h^j = \mathcal{A}_k^j \partial_i h^k = \delta_i^j, \quad \partial_k (J \mathcal{A}_i^k) = 0, \quad \partial_i h^j = \delta_i^j + \partial_i g^j, \quad \mathcal{A}_i^j = \delta_i^j - \mathcal{A}_i^k \partial_k g^j, \quad (2.3)$$

where the Einstein notation is used and will be used in the whole paper. If the displacement g is sufficiently small in an appropriate Sobolev space, then the flow mapping h is a diffeomorphism from Ω_0 to $\Omega(t)$, which allows us to switch back and forth from Lagrangian to Eulerian coordinates.

(2) Derivatives of J and $\mathcal{A}$ in Lagrangian coordinates

We write the derivatives of J and $\mathcal{A}$ in Lagrangian coordinates as follows:

$$\begin{aligned} \partial_t J &= J \mathcal{A}_i^j \partial_j v^i, & \partial_\ell J &= J \mathcal{A}_i^j \partial_j \partial_\ell g^i, & \partial_t \mathcal{A}_i^j &= -\mathcal{A}_k^j \mathcal{A}_i^\ell \partial_\ell v^k, \\ \partial_\ell \mathcal{A}_i^j &= -\mathcal{A}_k^j \mathcal{A}_i^n \partial_n \partial_\ell g^k, & \partial_i v^j &= \partial_i h^k \mathcal{A}_k^\ell \partial_\ell v^j = \mathcal{A}_i^\ell \partial_\ell v^j + \partial_i g^k \mathcal{A}_k^\ell \partial_\ell v^j. \end{aligned} \quad (2.4)$$

(3) Plasma equations in Lagrangian coordinates

Denote $(\nabla_{\mathcal{A}})_i = \mathcal{A}_i^j \partial_j$. Then we can write the plasma equations in Lagrangian coordinates as follows:

$$\left\{ \begin{array}{l} \partial_t g = v \quad \text{in } \overline{\Omega}, \\ f \partial_t v + \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} \left(q + \frac{1}{2} |b|^2 \right) - \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} \cdot \mathbb{S}_{\mathcal{A}}(v) = (b \cdot \nabla_{\mathcal{A}}) b \quad \text{in } \overline{\Omega}, \\ \partial_t f + f \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} \cdot v = 0 \quad \text{in } \overline{\Omega}, \\ \partial_t b + b \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} \cdot v = (b \cdot \nabla_{\mathcal{A}}) v \quad \text{in } \overline{\Omega}, \\ \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} \cdot b = 0 \quad \text{in } \overline{\Omega}, \\ n \cdot b = n \cdot \widehat{b} \quad \text{on } \Sigma_{0,pv}, \\ \left(q + \frac{1}{2} |b|^2 - \frac{1}{2} |\widehat{b}|^2 \right) \mathcal{N} - \mathbb{S}_{\mathcal{A}}(v) \mathcal{N} = 0 \quad \text{on } \Sigma_{0,pv}, \end{array} \right. \quad (2.5)$$

where $\mathbb{S}_{\mathcal{A}}(v) = \varepsilon \left(\nabla_{\mathcal{A}} v + \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} v^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div}_{\mathcal{A}} v \mathbb{I} \right) + \delta \operatorname{div}_{\mathcal{A}} v \mathbb{I}$ and the exterior magnetic field $\widehat{b}$ satisfies the vacuum equations (5.107) in Lagrangian coordinates which can be recalled from Appendix of Bian–Guo–Tice.^[1]

Since $\partial_t J = J \mathcal{A}_i^j \partial_j v^i = J \nabla_{\mathcal{A}} \cdot v$ and $J(0) = \det(Dh_0) = \det(I + Dg_0)$, with I the identity matrix, we find from the equation of f in (2.5) that $fJ = \rho_0(h_0) \det(I + Dg_0)$, where ρ_0 is given initial density function. Taking ρ_0 such that $\rho_0(h_0) \det(I + Dg_0) = \overline{\rho}$, we get

$$f = J^{-1} \overline{\rho}, \quad q = AJ^{-\gamma} \overline{\rho}^{\gamma}. \quad (2.6)$$

On the other hand, we multiply the magnetic field equation of (2.5) by $J\mathcal{A}^T$ to get

$$J\mathcal{A}_j^i \partial_t b^j + J\mathcal{A}_j^i b^j \mathcal{A}_k^h \partial_h v^k = J\mathcal{A}_j^i b^h \mathcal{A}_h^k \partial_k v^j,$$

which along with (2.4) implies

$$\begin{aligned} \partial_t (\mathcal{A}_j^i J b^j) &= J\mathcal{A}_j^i \partial_t b^j + \mathcal{A}_j^i b^j \partial_t J + J b^j \partial_t \mathcal{A}_j^i = J\mathcal{A}_j^i \partial_t b^j + J\mathcal{A}_j^i b^j \mathcal{A}_k^h \partial_h v^k \\ &\quad - J b^j \mathcal{A}_k^i \mathcal{A}_j^h \partial_h v^k = 0. \end{aligned}$$

Therefore, we have

$$J b^j \mathcal{A}_j^i = J(0) b_0^j \mathcal{A}_j^i(0) = \det(I + Dg_0) B_0^j(h_0) \mathcal{A}_j^i(0), \quad (2.7)$$

where B_0 is given initial magnetic field. Taking B_0 such that $\det(I + Dg_0) B_0^j(h_0) \mathcal{A}_j^i(0) = \overline{B}^i$, we obtain from (2.7) that

$$b^k = J^{-1} \overline{B}^i \partial_i h^k = J^{-1} \overline{B}^k + J^{-1} \overline{B}^i \partial_i g^k.$$

2.2. The equilibrium for the z-pinch plasma

We recall from Bian–Guo–Tice^[1] a z-pinch steady state of $\bar{u} = 0$, $B = (0, B_\theta(r), 0)$, $p = p(r)$, $\hat{B} = (0, \hat{B}_\theta(r), 0)$. Assume the equilibrium domains are given by

$$\begin{aligned}\bar{\Omega} &= \{(r, \theta, z) | r < r_0, \theta \in [0, 2\pi], z \in 2\pi\mathbb{T}\}, \\ \bar{\Omega}^v &= \{(r, \theta, z) | r_0 < r < r_w, \theta \in [0, 2\pi], z \in 2\pi\mathbb{T}\}.\end{aligned}$$

Here, the constant r_0 is the interface boundary and the constant r_w is the perfectly conducting wall position. This is meant to be a simplified model of the toroidal geometry employed in tokamaks.

Then by Lemmas 2.1, 2.4, 2.5, 2.6 and Corollary 2.7 in Bian–Guo–Tice^[1] we can get the following proposition describing the steady solution.

Proposition 2.1. *Assume that the function $p(r)$ satisfies $p(r) \geq 0$ and $p(r) = 0$ if and only if $r = r_0$, and*

$$-\int_0^r s^2 p'(s) ds \geq 0 \quad \text{for all } 0 \leq r \leq r_0, \quad p(r) \in C^{2,1}([0, r_0]). \quad (2.8)$$

Then, the cylindrically symmetric steady solution $\bar{u} = 0$, $B = B(r)$, $\mathbb{J}_z = \mathbb{J}_z(r)$, $\hat{B} = \hat{B}(r)$ with a function $p(r)$ taking the form of

$$\left\{ \begin{array}{l} B_r = 0, \quad B_z = 0, \quad B_\theta(r) = \left(-\frac{2}{r^2} \int_0^r s^2 p'(s) ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}}, \\ \mathbb{J}_z(r) = \frac{1}{2} \left(-\frac{2}{r^2} \int_0^r s^2 p'(s) ds \right)^{-\frac{1}{2}} \left(\frac{4}{r^3} \int_0^r s^2 p'(s) ds - 2p'(r) \right) \\ \quad + \frac{1}{r} \left(-\frac{2}{r^2} \int_0^r s^2 p'(s) ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \quad \text{in } \bar{\Omega}, \\ \hat{B}_r = 0, \quad \hat{B}_z = 0, \quad \hat{B}_\theta(r) = B_\theta(r_0) \frac{r_0}{r} \quad \text{in } \bar{\Omega}^v, \end{array} \right. \quad (2.9)$$

solves the equilibrium equations in plasma domain,

$$\nabla p = \mathbb{J} \times B, \quad \nabla \cdot B = 0, \quad \mathbb{J} = \nabla \times B, \quad (2.10)$$

and the system (1.3) in the vacuum region. We can define the equilibrium density

$$\rho(r) = \left(\frac{p(r)}{A} \right)^{1/\gamma}.$$

Moreover, we have

$$\mathbb{J}_z \in C^{1,1}([0, r_0]), \quad B_\theta \in C^{1,1}([0, r_0]), \quad (2.11)$$

and the steady solution satisfies the following properties:

(i) There exists $r_* \in (0, r_0)$ such that

$$p'(r_*) + \frac{2\gamma p(r_*) B_\theta^2(r_*)}{r_*(\gamma p(r_*) + B_\theta^2(r_*))} < 0. \quad (2.12)$$

(ii) For $|m| \geq 2$, suppose that $\mathbb{J}_z : [0, r_0] \rightarrow [0, \infty)$ is non-increasing, then we have

$$2p'(r) + m^2 \frac{B_\theta^2(r)}{r} \geq 0 \quad \text{for all } r \in [0, r_0].$$

(iii) For $|m| \geq 2$, we define $\alpha = (m^2 - 2)/2 \geq 1$. Suppose that $\beta > \alpha \geq 0$ and $\mathbb{J}_z$ vanishes to order β at the origin $r = 0$ in the sense that $|\mathbb{J}_z(r)| \leq Cr^\beta$, and further suppose that $B_\theta \neq 0$ in $(0, r_0]$, i.e. B_θ has a sign. Then, there exists $r^* \in (0, r_0)$ such that

$$2p'(r^*) + m^2 \frac{B_\theta^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0.$$

(iv) If $\mathbb{J}_z \geq 0$ and $\mathbb{J}_z$ is compactly supported in $(0, r_0)$, then for each $m \in \mathbb{Z} \setminus \{0\}$, there exists $r^* \in (0, r_0)$ such that

$$2p'(r^*) + m^2 \frac{B_\theta^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0.$$

We remark that in Proposition 2.1, the property (i) implies unconditional instability of any z -pinch equilibrium for $m = 0$. The property (ii) implies absence of instability for $|m| \geq 2$ for a general class of z -pinch equilibria. The property (iii) implies the instability for $|m| \geq 2$ for some class of z -pinch equilibria. And the property (iv) implies the instability for any $m \in \mathbb{Z} \setminus \{0\}$ for some class of z -pinch equilibria.

From Proposition 2.1 we know that at the plasma-vacuum interface, the steady solution $B(r)$ in cylindrical r, θ, z -coordinates satisfies naturally

$$n_0 \cdot B = n_0 \cdot \widehat{B} = 0, \quad \text{on } \Sigma_{0,pv},$$

due to $n_0 = e_r$, $B = (0, B_\theta(r), 0)$ and $\widehat{B} = (0, B_\theta(r_0) \frac{r}{r_0}, 0)$.

Now, we introduce the admissibility of the pressure p , which will be used in the following sections.

Definition 2.1. We say that p is admissible if $p(r) \geq 0$ for all $r \in [0, r_0]$ and $p(r) = 0$ if and only if $r = r_0$, $p'(r) \leq 0$ for r near r_0 , that is, $p'(s) \leq 0$ for $s \in (r_0 - \epsilon, r_0]$ with small constant $\epsilon > 0$, and $p(r)$ satisfies (2.8) and

$$\lim_{r \rightarrow r_0} \frac{p(r)}{p'(r)} = 0. \quad (2.13)$$

2.3. Lagrangian formulation and main results

From the Lagrangian formulation in Appendix of Bian–Guo–Tice,^[1] the linearized viscous compressible MHD system in a perturbation formulation around the steady

solution in (2.9) takes the following form:

with $Q = \nabla \times (g \times B)$.

Notations: Define the energy

$$E[g, \widehat{Q}] = E^p[g] + E^s[g] + E^v[\widehat{Q}], \quad (2.15)$$

where $E^p[g]$, $E^s[g]$ and $E^v[\widehat{Q}]$ are three real numbers, satisfying

In order to introduce the energy E , using Lemma 5.4 formally we can get that

Our goal is to prove that there exists functions g and $\widehat{Q}$ such that $\inf_{\int_{\overline{\Omega}} \rho g^2 dx = 1} E[g, \widehat{Q}] < 0$.

The main purpose of this paper is to construct the growing mode solution of the form

(r, θ, z) are the cylindrical coordinates, $m, k \in \mathbb{Z}$, and the subscripts m and k will be dropped for notational simplicity. Here, g_θ and g_z are pure imaginary functions, g_r , $\widehat{Q}_r$, $\widehat{Q}_\theta$ and $\widehat{Q}_z$ are real-valued functions, then we define new three real-valued functions

We impose the boundary conditions (2.23) and (2.24) as constraint for variational problem setup and the boundary condition (2.25) follows the minimizer solution. When $m = 0$, we know that $\widehat{Q}_r = 0$ on the boundary $r = r_0$, which implies that $\widehat{Q}_r$ is separated from interior variational problem. Obviously, it holds that $\widehat{Q} = 0$.

Therefore, for the case $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, the energy functional (2.15) reduces to

For the case $m \neq 0$ and any k , the solution $\widehat{Q}_r$ and ξ are related by the boundary conditions (2.24), so we cannot set $\widehat{Q}_r = 0$, therefore the energy functional takes the form of

When using the notation g , the norms $\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_1^2$ and $\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_2^2$ are equivalent to

We denote $\partial_{tt}f = f_{tt}$. Assume the steady solution $(\bar{u}, B, p)$ in plasma satisfies $\bar{u} = 0$, $B = (0, B_{\theta}(r), 0)$, $p = p(r)$ and the steady solution $\hat{B}$ in the vacuum region satisfies $\hat{B} = (0, \hat{B}_{\theta}(r), 0)$ with $\hat{B}_{\theta}(r) = B_{\theta}(r_0) \frac{r_0}{r}$, which are stated in (2.9). Our main results are as follows.

Theorem 2.1. Assume (2.13) and Definition 2.1/the admissibility of the pressure p holds. Then, we have

- (1) For the modes $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, $\lambda_{0,k} = \inf_{(\xi, \eta) \in \mathcal{A}_1} E_{0,k} < 0$, with the set $\mathcal{A}_1$ defined in (3.28), there is always growing mode of z -pinch instability.
- (2) For the modes $m \neq 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, if there exists r^* such that $2p'(r^*) + \frac{m^2 B_{\theta}^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0$, then $\mu_{m,k} = \sqrt{-\lambda_{m,k}}$ is the growing mode to the linearized PDE (2.14), see also (3.11) and (3.12).
- (3)

$$0 < \sup_B \mu = \Lambda < \infty, \quad \text{where } B = \{(m, k) \in \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z} \mid \lambda_{m,k} < 0\}. \quad (2.32)$$

- (4) Moreover, assume the initial data $\sqrt{\rho}(g_t(0), g_{tt}(0)) \in L^2(0, r_0)$, $\hat{Q}_t(0) \in L^2(r_0, r_w)$ and $\|g_t(0)\|_2$ is bounded, which is defined in (2.31), and assume g be a H^2 solution to (2.14). Then, we have

Remark 2.1. The main goal of this paper is to study the growing modes to the linearized system (2.14), and we will leave the construction of H^2 solutions for general initial conditions for the future study.

Remark 2.2. In plasma literature, instability with $|m| = 0$ is called a Sausage instability, and instability with $|m| = 1$ is called a Kink instability.

We construct a largest growing mode which dominates the linear dynamics around a z -pinch steady state in the presence of viscosity effect. The main difficulties and innovations are as follows. Beside the degeneracy both at the origin and the boundary, and the singularity of $\frac{1}{r}$ at the origin, we have several new difficulties in this paper.

In the presence of viscosity, there is no natural variational framework for constructing growing mode solutions to the linearized problem. We use the modified variational method by studying a family of modified variational problems to produce the growing modes. More precisely, we artificially remove the linear dependence on μ , and we define two modified viscosities $\tilde{\varepsilon} = s\varepsilon$ and $\tilde{\delta} = s\delta$, instead of $\mu\varepsilon$ and $\mu\delta$, where $s > 0$ is an arbitrary parameter, then we can introduce a family of modified problem (3.11) along with boundary conditions

$$\begin{aligned} \widehat{Q}_r &= 0, \quad \text{at } r = r_w, \\ m\widehat{B}_\theta\xi &= r\widehat{Q}_r, \quad \text{at } r = r_0, \\ [B_\theta^2\xi - B_\theta^2\xi'r + kB_\theta^2\eta r - \widehat{B}_\theta\widehat{Q}_\theta r]n \\ &\quad - \tilde{\varepsilon}(2\xi'r, -i\zeta'r + im\xi + i\zeta, i\eta'r + ik\xi r)^T \\ &\quad - \left(\tilde{\delta} - \frac{2}{3}\tilde{\varepsilon}\right)[\xi'r + \xi + m\zeta - k\eta r]n = 0, \quad \text{at } r = r_0. \end{aligned}$$

A solution to the modified problem with $\mu = s$ corresponds to a solution to the original problem (3.10). Modifying the problem in this way restores the variational structure and allows us to apply a constrained minimization to the viscous analogue of the energy $E_{0,k}$ defined in (2.26) and $E_{m,k}$ defined in (2.27) to find a solution to (3.11) with $\mu = \mu(s) > 0$ when $s > 0$ is sufficiently small. When $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, we define

where the space X_k is defined in Definition 3.1, the space $Y_{m,k}$ is defined in Definition 3.2 and

We then further exploit the variational structure to show that λ is a continuous function and is strictly increasing in s . Using this, we show in Proposition 3.6 when

$m = 0$ and Proposition 3.13 when $m \neq 0$ that the parameter s can be uniquely chosen so that

which implies that we have found a solution to the original problem (3.10).

In contrast to the inviscid case, the ill-posedness is now excluded. Thanks to the viscous effect, we are able to show that there exists the biggest growing mode for any m and k , and prove $\lim_{m, k \rightarrow \infty} \mu_{m, k} = 0$ by a contradiction argument, see Proposition 4.2. More precisely, suppose that

The key is to establish

$$D_{m, k} \gtrsim k^2 + m^2,$$

which involves delicate analysis for weighted estimates for $\int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr$, $\int_0^{r_0} \frac{\eta^2}{r} dr$ and $\int_0^{r_0} \frac{\zeta^2}{r} dr$. Precise algebraic manipulations have to be carried out to analyze the lower bound of the viscous dissipation, for each case of $m = 0$, $|m| = 1$ and $|m| \geq 2$ separately in Sec. 4.

3. A Family of Modified Variational Problems

3.1. Growing mode ansatz and cylindrical coordinates

In order to see the property of the force operator

we consider two displacement vector fields g and h defined over the plasma volume V , their associated magnetic field perturbations

$$Q = \nabla \times (g \times B), \quad R = \nabla \times (h \times B),$$

and the vacuum perturbations $\widehat{Q}$ and $\widehat{R}$ defined over the vacuum volume $\widehat{V}$ are their extensions, that is, to “extend” the function g into the vacuum by means of the magnetic field variable $\widehat{Q}$, and likewise to “extend” h by means of $\widehat{R}$. Then by Theorem IV 4.11 of [2] Chap. 6 of Goedbloed–Poedts^[4] and Lemma A.3 of Bian–Guo–Tice,^[1] we have the following lemma.

Lemma 3.1. *Assume g is a H^2 solution of the system (2.14), then we get a meaning expression for the potential energy of interface plasma by identifying g , h , $\widehat{Q}$ and $\widehat{R}$, in the quadratic form*

which is symmetric in g and h , and their extensions $\widehat{Q}$ and $\widehat{R}$, if $\varepsilon = \delta = 0$.

Using the estimates in Lemma A.3 in Bian–Guo–Tice,^[1] we get that

& -\frac{1}{2}\nabla \cdot [(\nabla \times B \times B) \cdot (gh - hg)] \\
& + \operatorname{div} \left[\left(\varepsilon \left(\nabla g_t + \nabla g_t^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) + \delta \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) h \right] \\
& - \left(\varepsilon \left(\nabla g_t + \nabla g_t^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) + \delta \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) : \nabla h.
\end{aligned} \tag{3.3}$$

Integrating (3.3) gives that

& \quad + \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot h (g \cdot \nabla p - B \cdot Q + \gamma p \nabla \cdot g) \, dx \\
& \quad + \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot h \operatorname{Tr} \left[\left(\varepsilon \left(\nabla g_t + \nabla g_t^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) + \delta \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) \right] \, dx \\
& \quad - \int_{\Omega} \left(\varepsilon \left(\nabla g_t + \nabla g_t^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) + \delta \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I} \right) : \nabla h \, dx.

There are no contributions from the eighth, ninth and tenth terms of (3.3) to the surface integral, since $n \cdot B = 0$ and $n \cdot \nabla \times B = 0$ on the plasma surface, whereas $\nabla \times B \times B$ is parallel to n . From the second interface condition of (2.14), the surface integral takes the form of

& = - \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot hg \cdot \left[\left[\nabla \left(p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 \right) \right] \right] \, dx - \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot h \hat{B} \cdot \hat{Q} \, dx \\
& = - \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot g n \cdot h n \cdot \left[\left[\nabla \left(p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 \right) \right] \right] \, dx - \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot h \hat{B} \cdot \hat{Q} \, dx \\
& = - \int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot g n \cdot h n \cdot \left[\left[\nabla \left(p + \frac{1}{2} |B|^2 \right) \right] \right] \, dx - \int_{\Omega^v} \hat{Q} \cdot \hat{R} \, dx.
\end{aligned} \tag{3.5}$$

Here, we have used the facts $-\int_{\Sigma_{0,pv}} n \cdot h \hat{B} \cdot \hat{Q} \, dx = -\int_{\Omega^v} \hat{Q} \cdot \hat{R} \, dx$ (Lemma A.3 in Ref. [1]), the equilibrium jump condition $[[p + \frac{1}{2}|B|^2]] = 0$, which implies that the

tangential derivative of the jump vanishes as well $\vec{t} \cdot [[\nabla(p + \frac{1}{2}|B|^2)]] = 0$, where $\vec{t}$ is an arbitrary unit vector tangential to the surface.

This finishes the proof. $\square$

We now record several computations in cylindrical coordinates.

Lemma 3.2. *Let $\tilde{\varepsilon} = \mu\varepsilon$ and $\tilde{\delta} = \mu\delta$. We decompose $E_{m,k}$ as follows:*

the surface energy vanishes

and when $m \neq 0$ and any k , the vacuum energy takes the form of

Proof. Recall (ξ, η, ζ) in (2.21) and (2.20). The proofs of (3.8) and (3.9) can be recalled from the Lemma 3.1 in Ref. [1] so we only need to prove (3.7). Inserting the expressions of (2.22) into (2.16) and using $\xi_\theta^* = i\zeta$, we can get (3.7). In fact,

\nabla g &= \begin{pmatrix} \partial_r g_r & \partial_r g_\theta & \partial_r g_z \\ \frac{i m g_r}{r} - \frac{g_\theta}{r} & \frac{i m g_\theta}{r} + \frac{g_r}{r} & \frac{i m g_z}{r} \\ i k g_r & i k g_\theta & i k g_z \end{pmatrix} \\
&= \begin{pmatrix} \xi' & -i\zeta' & i\eta' \\ \frac{i m}{r} \xi + \frac{i\zeta}{r} & \frac{m}{r} \zeta + \frac{\xi}{r} & -\frac{m}{r} \eta \\ i k \xi & k \zeta & -k \eta \end{pmatrix}, \\
\nabla g + \nabla g^T &= \begin{pmatrix} 2\xi' & -i\zeta' + \frac{i m}{r} \xi + \frac{i\zeta}{r} & i\eta' + i k \xi \\ -i\zeta' + \frac{i m}{r} \xi + \frac{i\zeta}{r} & \frac{2m}{r} \zeta + \frac{2\xi}{r} & -\frac{m}{r} \eta + k \zeta \\ i\eta' + i k \xi & -\frac{m}{r} \eta + k \zeta & -2k \eta \end{pmatrix}, \\
\operatorname{div} g &= \begin{pmatrix} \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k \eta + \frac{m}{r} \zeta & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k \eta + \frac{m}{r} \zeta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k \eta + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \end{pmatrix}.

By $p' = -B_\theta B'_\theta - \frac{B_\theta^2}{r}$, we have

\end{aligned}$$

with

$$\beta_0 = \frac{1}{r} \left[\frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r^3} + \frac{2m^2 B_\theta (\frac{B_\theta}{r})'}{r (m^2 + k^2 r^2)} - \frac{4k^2 m^2 B_\theta^2}{r (m^2 + k^2 r^2)^2} + \frac{2k^2 p'}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} \right].$$

Combining the above identities with (2.16) and (2.22) yields (3.7). $\square$

Using $g(r, \theta, z, t) = (g_r(r, t), g_\theta(r, t), g_z(r, t)) e^{i(m\theta + kz)}$, we can prove that the second equation in (2.14) is reduced to the following system.

with

Proof. Inserting the expression (2.22) into the second equation in (2.14), by $g(r, \theta, z, t) = (g_r(r, t), g_\theta(r, t), g_z(r, t))e^{i(m\theta + kz)}$ and the definitions of ξ , η and ζ in (2.21), we can easily get that the second equation in (2.14) reduces to (3.10). $\square$

We now use the idea of modifying the viscosity parameters in Guo–Tice.^[8] Taking the normal mode (2.20) in Lemma 3.2, in order to restore the ability to use variational methods, we artificially remove the linear dependence on μ . We define two modified viscosities $\tilde{\varepsilon} = s\varepsilon$ and $\tilde{\delta} = s\delta$, instead of $\mu\varepsilon$ and $\mu\delta$, where $s > 0$ is an arbitrary parameter, we can get modified problem as follows.

Lemma 3.4. Assume $g(r, \theta, z, t) = (g_r(r, t), g_\theta(r, t), g_z(r, t))e^{\mu t + i(m\theta + kz)}$ solves the second equation in (2.14), then

$$\begin{pmatrix} \frac{d}{dr} \frac{\gamma p + B_\theta^2}{r} \frac{d}{dr} r - \frac{m^2}{r^2} B_\theta^2 - r \left(\frac{B_\theta^2}{r^2} \right)' & -\frac{d}{dr} k(\gamma p + B_\theta^2) - \frac{2kB_\theta^2}{r} & \frac{d}{dr} \frac{m}{r} \gamma p \\ \frac{k(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)}{r} \frac{d}{dr} r - \frac{2kB_\theta^2}{r} & -k^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2) - \frac{m^2}{r^2} B_\theta^2 & \frac{mk}{r} \gamma p \\ -\frac{m\gamma p}{r^2} \frac{d}{dr} r & \frac{mk}{r} \gamma p & -\frac{m^2}{r^2} \gamma p \end{pmatrix} \times \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} a_{11} & a_{12} & a_{13} \\ a_{21} & a_{22} & a_{23} \\ a_{31} & a_{32} & a_{33} \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix} = \rho \mu^2 \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix}, \quad (3.11)$$

with

$$\begin{aligned} a_{11} &= \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d^2}{dr^2} + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{1}{r} - \tilde{\varepsilon} \left(\frac{m^2}{r^2} + k^2 \right), & a_{12} &= - \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr}, \\ a_{13} &= \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{m}{r} - \frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}m}{r^2}, & a_{21} &= \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{k}{r}, \\ a_{22} &= \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r} \frac{d}{dr} - \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{m^2}{r^2} - \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k^2, & a_{23} &= \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{mk}{r}, \\ a_{31} &= - \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{m}{r} \frac{d}{dr} - \left(\frac{7\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{m}{r^2}, & a_{32} &= \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{mk}{r}, \\ a_{33} &= \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d}{dr} \frac{1}{r} - \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{m^2}{r^2} - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2. \end{aligned}$$

Proof. Inserting the expression (2.22) into the second equation in (2.14), by $g(r, \theta, z, t) = (g_r(r, t), g_\theta(r, t), g_z(r, t))e^{\mu t + i(m\theta + kz)}$ and the definitions of ξ , η and ζ in (2.21), we can easily get that the second equation in (2.14) reduces to (3.11). $\square$

In order to study the stability to use variational methods in vacuum domain, we use the following second-order ODE about $\hat{Q}_r$ for $m \neq 0$ and any k .

Lemma 3.5. Lemma 3.5 in Ref. [1]. The vacuum equations (2.14)₃ and (2.14)₄ can be reduced to the second-order differential equation

with the other two components $\hat{Q}_\theta = -\frac{m}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (r \hat{Q}_r)'$ and $\hat{Q}_z = -\frac{kr}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (r \hat{Q}_r)'$.

3.2. Modified variational problem when $m = 0$

In this subsection, we will introduce the definition of the function space X_k and its properties, then give the modified variational analysis for the case $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$. We first introduce the definition of the function space X_k for any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$ and its properties.

Definition 3.1. The weighted Sobolev space X_k is defined as the completion of $\{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in C^\infty([0, r_0]) \times C^\infty([0, r_0]) \times C^\infty([0, r_0]) | \xi(0) = \zeta(0) = 0\}$, with respect to the norm

$$\begin{aligned} \|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{X_k}^2 = & \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 + \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ & + \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + 2k\eta \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 + k^2\zeta^2 \Big] r dr \\ & + \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \rho(|\xi|^2 + |\eta|^2 + |\zeta|^2) r dr. \end{aligned} \quad (3.13)$$

Next, we consider the basic estimate of ξ on the interval $(0, \frac{r_0}{6})$.

Lemma 3.6. For any $r \in (0, \frac{r_0}{6})$, it holds that

$$\xi(r) \leq \sqrt{\frac{6}{r_0}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{6}}^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi(a)|^2 da \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} + \left| \left(\int_r^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \right| \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right|^{\frac{1}{2}}. \quad (3.14)$$

Proof. Notice that $|\xi(r)| = |\xi(a) - \int_r^a \xi' dr| \leq |\xi(a)| + |(\int_r^a |\xi'|^2 s ds)^{\frac{1}{2}} (\int_r^a \frac{1}{s} ds)^{\frac{1}{2}}|$. Integrating the above inequality about a on the interval $(\frac{r_0}{6}, \frac{r_0}{3})$, we have

$$\frac{r_0}{6} |\xi(r)| \leq \int_{\frac{r_0}{6}}^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi(a)| da + \frac{r_0}{6} \left| \left(\int_r^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \right| \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right|^{\frac{1}{2}},$$

□

which gives (3.14).

Then, we introduce the estimate of $\xi(r)$ for any $r \in (\frac{r_0}{3}, r_0)$.

Lemma 3.7. For any $r \in (\frac{r_0}{3}, r_0)$, it holds that

$$\xi(r) \leq \sqrt{\frac{6}{r_0}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{\frac{r_0}{2}} |\xi(b)|^2 db \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} + \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^r |\xi'|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} - \ln(r_0 - r) \right|^{\frac{1}{2}}. \quad (3.15)$$

Proof. Notice that

$$\xi(r) = \xi(b) + \int_b^r \xi' dr \leq \xi(b) + \left(\int_b^r |\xi'|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_b^r \frac{1}{r_0 - s} ds \right)^{\frac{1}{2}}.$$

Integrating the above inequality about b on the interval $(\frac{r_0}{3}, \frac{r_0}{2})$, we have

which is divided by $\frac{r_0}{6}$, gives (3.15). $\square$

From Definition 3.1, Lemmas 3.6 and 3.7 we can show the following compactness results.

Proposition 3.1. *Let π_i for $i = 1, 2, 3$ denote the projection operator onto the i th factor, there holds that $\pi_i : X_k \rightarrow Z_i$ is a bounded, linear, compact map for $i = 1, 2, 3$, where the spaces*

$$Z_1 = \{\xi \in L^2(0, r_0)\}, \quad Z_2 = \{\eta \in L^2(0, r_0)\}, \quad Z_3 = \{\zeta \in L^2(0, r_0)\}. \quad (3.16)$$

We denote them by

$$X_k \subset\subset Z_1, \quad (3.17)$$

$$X_k \subset\subset Z_2, \quad (3.18)$$

$$X_k \subset\subset Z_3. \quad (3.19)$$

Proof. Assume that $\|(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n)\|_{X_k} \leq C$ for $n \in \mathbb{N}$. When $m = 0$, from Proposition 4.1, we know that

$$\int_0^{r_0} \xi_n'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \eta_n'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \zeta_n'^2 r dr \leq C.$$

Fix any $\kappa > 0$. We claim that there exists a subsequence $\{\xi_{n_i}\}$ so that

$$\sup_{i,j} \|\xi_{n_i} - \xi_{n_j}\|_{Z_1} \leq \kappa. \quad (3.20)$$

Therefore, from Lemma 3.6, choosing $0 < s_0 < \frac{r_0}{3}$ small enough such that $C(\frac{6}{r_0} + |\ln \frac{r_0}{3}| + 1)s_0 \leq \frac{\kappa}{6}$, then we have

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{s_0} \xi_n^2(r) dr &\leq \frac{6C}{r_0} s_0 + C \int_0^{s_0} \left| \left(\int_r^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi_n'|^2 s ds \right) \right| \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right| dr \\ &\leq \frac{6C}{r_0} s_0 + C \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} \right| s_0 + C |s_0 \ln s_0| \\ &\leq C \left(\frac{6}{r_0} + \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} \right| + \right) s_0 \leq \frac{\kappa}{6}. \end{aligned} \quad (3.21)$$

On the other hand, choosing $\frac{r_0}{3} < s_1 < r_0$ and s_1 close enough to r_0 , such that $C(\frac{6}{r_0} + |\ln \frac{2r_0}{3}| + 1)(r_0 - s_1) \leq \frac{\kappa}{6}$, by Lemma 3.7 we can show that

$$\begin{aligned} \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \xi_n^2(r) dr &\leq \frac{6C}{r_0}(r_0 - s_1) + C \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^r |\xi'_n|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \right) \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} - \ln(r_0 - r) \right| dr \\ &\leq \frac{6C}{r_0}(r_0 - s_1) + C \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} - \ln(r_0 - r) \right| dr \\ &\leq \frac{6C}{r_0}(r_0 - s_1) + C \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} \right| (r_0 - s_1) + C(r_0 - s_1) \\ &\quad + C |\ln(r_0 - s_1)(r_0 - s_1)| \\ &\leq C \left(\frac{6}{r_0} + \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} \right| + 1 \right) (r_0 - s_1) \leq \frac{\kappa}{6}, \end{aligned} \quad (3.22)$$

where we have used the facts

$$\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |r_0 - r| |\xi'|^2 dr \leq \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 r dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 r_0 dr \leq C.$$

Since the subinterval (s_0, s_1) avoids the singularity of $\frac{1}{r}$ and the degenerate of the density ρ on the boundary $r = r_0$, the function ξ_n is uniformly bounded in $H^1(s_0, s_1)$. By the compact embedding $H^1(s_0, s_1) \subset\subset C^0(s_0, s_1)$, one can extract a subsequence $\{\xi_{n_i}\}$ that converges in $L^\infty(s_0, s_1)$. So for i, j large enough, it holds that $\sup_{i,j} \|\xi_{n_i} - \xi_{n_j}\|_{L^\infty(s_0, s_1)}^2 \leq \frac{\kappa}{3(s_1 - s_0)}$. Then along the above subsequence one can get from (3.21) and (3.22) that

$$\begin{aligned} \|\xi_{n_i} - \xi_{n_j}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}^2 &= \int_0^{r_0} |\xi_{n_i} - \xi_{n_j}|^2 dr = \int_0^{s_0} + \int_{s_0}^{s_1} + \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \\ &\leq 2C \left(\frac{6}{r_0} + \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} \right| + 1 \right) s_0 + (s_1 - s_0) \sup_{i,j} \|\eta_{n_i}\| \\ &\quad - \eta_{n_j}\|_{L^\infty(s_0, s_1)}^2 + 2C \left(\frac{6}{r_0} + \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} \right| + 1 \right) (r_0 - s_1) \leq \kappa, \end{aligned} \quad (3.23)$$

which implies the claim (3.20) and the compactness result (3.17). Similarly as the above estimates, we can prove (3.18) and (3.19). We finish the proof. $\square$

Now, we give the variational analysis about the case $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$. In order to understand μ , we consider the energy (2.26) and

$$\mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) = 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \rho(|\xi|^2 + |\eta|^2 + |\zeta|^2) r dr. \quad (3.24)$$

From Definition 3.1 and Proposition 3.1, we can get that $E_{0,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are both well defined on the space X_k .

Lemma 3.8. $E_{0,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are both well defined on the space X_k .

Proof. Applying Lemma 3.6 we get for $0 < s_0 < \frac{r_0}{6}$ small enough that

$$\begin{aligned} \left| \int_0^{s_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| &\leq C \int_0^{s_0} \xi^2 dr \leq C \int_0^{s_0} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{6}}^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi(b)|^2 db \right) dr \\ &\quad + C \int_0^{s_0} \left(\int_r^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \right) \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right| dr \\ &\leq C\mathcal{J} + C \left(\int_0^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \right) \int_0^{s_0} \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right| dr \\ &\leq C\mathcal{J} + C \int_0^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \leq C\mathcal{J} + C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{X_k}^2. \end{aligned}$$

On the other hand, from the proof of Proposition 3.1 it follows that

$$\left| \int_{s_0}^{r_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| \leq C \int_{s_0}^{r_0} \xi^2 dr \leq C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{X_k}^2.$$

Hence, we get that

$$\left| \int_0^{r_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| \leq C\mathcal{J} + C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{X_k}^2, \quad (3.25)$$

which implies from Proposition 3.1 that

$$\begin{aligned} |E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)| &\leq C\mathcal{J} + C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{X_k}^2 + C \int_0^{r_0} \left\{ B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right]^2 \right\} r dr \\ &\quad + C \int_0^{r_0} p \left| \frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' \right|^2 r dr + C\|\rho\|_{L^\infty}^{\gamma-1} \int_0^{r_0} \rho |\eta|^2 r dr \\ &\quad + C \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 + \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + 2k\eta \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 + k^2\zeta^2 \right] \\ &\quad \times r dr + C \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 r dr \leq C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{X_k}^2. \end{aligned}$$

Hence, $E_{0,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are both well-defined on the space X_k . □

Define function $g(r) = \sup_{r \leq s \leq r_0} \frac{p(s)}{-p'(s)}$, then by Definition 2.1/admissibility of the pressure p , we can get the following lemma.

Lemma 3.9. *Lemma 3.7 in Ref. [1] Assume s_1 near r_0 , then it holds that*

$$\int_{s_1}^{r_0} -p'(r)\xi^2 dr \leq 2p(s_1)\xi^2(s_1) + 4g(s_1) \int_{s_1}^{r_0} p\xi'^2 dr, \quad (3.26)$$

with $g(s_1) \rightarrow 0$ as $s_1 \rightarrow r_0$.

Now, we define

$$\lambda(s) = \inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k} \frac{E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta; s)}{\mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)}. \quad (3.27)$$

Consider the set

$$\mathcal{A}_1 = \{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k | \mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) = 1\}. \quad (3.28)$$

We want to show that the infimum of $E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)$ over the set $\mathcal{A}_1$ is achieved and is negative. And then we show that the minimizer solves (3.11) with $m = 0$ and $k \neq 0$ and the corresponding boundary conditions. First, we prove that the energy $E_{0,k}$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_1$ and the coercivity estimate holds.

Lemma 3.10. *The energy $E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_1$ and any minimizing sequence (ξ_n, η_n, ζ_n) is bounded in X_k .*

Proof. We can directly get from (2.26) that

$$\begin{aligned} & E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \\ & \geq 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left\{ \frac{2p'\xi^2}{r} + \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' - k\eta \right]^2 \right\} r dr \\ & \quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \tilde{\varepsilon} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ & \quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \tilde{\delta} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 r dr \\ & \geq 2\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ & \quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ & \quad + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} p'\xi^2 dr \\ & \geq 2\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} p'\xi^2 dr, \end{aligned} \quad (3.29)$$

for any $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}$. Here, we have used the facts that $a^2 + b^2 \geq \frac{1}{2}(a - b)^2$, with $a = -2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta$, $b = \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta$; $a = \xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - k\eta$, $b = \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta$. By Lemma [3.6](#) choosing $0 < s_0 < \frac{r_0}{6}$ small enough such that $Cs_0 \leq \frac{1}{4}$, we obtain that

$$\begin{aligned}
 \left| \int_0^{s_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| &\leq C \int_0^{s_0} \xi^2 dr \leq C \int_0^{s_0} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{6}}^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi(b)|^2 db \right) dr \\
 &\quad + C \int_0^{s_0} \left(\int_r^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \right) \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right| dr \\
 &\leq C\mathcal{J}s_0 + C \left(\int_0^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \right) \int_0^{s_0} \left| \ln \frac{r_0}{3} - \ln r \right| dr \\
 &\leq C\mathcal{J}s_0 + Cs_0 \int_0^{\frac{r_0}{3}} |\xi'|^2 s ds \\
 &\leq C\mathcal{J}s_0 + 2Cs_0\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr \\
 &\leq C\mathcal{J}s_0 + \frac{1}{2}\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr.
 \end{aligned} \tag{3.30}$$

On the other hand, from the proof of Proposition [3.1](#), choosing $s_0 < s_1 < r_0$ close to r_0 such that $C(r_0 - s_1) \leq \frac{1}{4}$, we get that

$$\left| \int_{s_0}^{s_1} p' \xi^2 dr \right| \leq C \int_{s_0}^{s_1} \xi^2 dr \leq C\mathcal{J} \tag{3.31}$$

and

$$\begin{aligned}
 \left| \int_{s_1}^{r_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| &\leq C \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \xi^2 dr \leq C(r_0 - s_1) \|\xi\|_{L^\infty(s_1, r_0)}^2 \\
 &\leq C(r_0 - s_1) \|\xi\|_{H^1(s_1, r_0)}^2 \\
 &\leq C(r_0 - s_1) \pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \left(\int_{s_1}^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \right) \\
 &\leq C(r_0 - s_1) \pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \right) \\
 &\leq \frac{1}{4} \pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \right),
 \end{aligned} \tag{3.32}$$

where we have used the facts $H^1(s_1, r_0) \subset\subset L^\infty(s_1, r_0)$. Therefore, we can prove

$$\begin{aligned}
 E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) &\geq \pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \frac{3}{2} \pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr - 2C\mathcal{J} \\
 &\geq -2C\mathcal{J} = -2C,
 \end{aligned} \tag{3.33}$$

which gives that the energy $E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_1$. Using the facts that $\mathcal{J} = 1$ and $E_{0,k}$ has a lower bound on set $\mathcal{A}_1$, we can choose a minimizing sequence such that along the minimizing sequence, we have $M \leq E_{0,k}(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n) < M + 1$, and for the minimizing sequence, we can show coercivity estimate:

$$\|(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n)\|_{X_k}^2 \leq C\mathcal{J} + C(M + 1) \leq C. \quad (3.34)$$

□

We now show that the infimum of $E_{0,k}$ over the set $\mathcal{A}_1$ is negative for the case $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$.

Proposition 3.2. *For any fixed $k = k_0$, there exists constant $s_0 > 0$ depending on ε , δ and k_0 so that for sufficiently small $s \leq s_0$, it holds that $\lambda = \inf E_{0,k} < 0$.*

Proof. Since both $E_{0,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are homogeneous degree 2, it suffices to show that

$$\inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k} \frac{E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)}{\mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)} < 0.$$

Since $\mathcal{J}$ is positive definite, one may reduce to constructing $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k$ (see (3.13)) such that $E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) < 0$. Notice that the first integral in the energy (2.26) can be rewritten as

$$\begin{aligned} & 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left\{ \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \xi^2 + (\gamma p + B_\theta^2) \right. \\ & \left. \times \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r} \left((r\xi)' - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{\gamma p + B_\theta^2} \xi \right) \right]^2 \right\} r dr. \end{aligned}$$

From the property (i) of Proposition 2.1 we can choose a smooth function $\xi^* \in C_c^\infty(0, r_0)$ such that

$$2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \xi^{*2} r dr < 0.$$

Then, we can assume that $k\eta^* = \frac{1}{r}((r\xi^*)' - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{\gamma p + B_\theta^2}\xi^*)$, such that the second term in $E_{0,k}(\xi^*, \eta^*, \zeta^*)$ vanishes. Here, ξ^* and η^* are smooth function, belong to the space X_k . Then we choose $\zeta^* = 0$.

From $\xi^* \in C_c^\infty(0, r_0)$ and $k\eta^* = \frac{1}{r}((r\xi^*)' - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{\gamma p + B_\theta^2}\xi^*)$, for any finite fixed $k = k_0$, it follows that

$$\begin{aligned} & 2\pi^2 \varepsilon \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} - k\eta^* \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} - \frac{2\xi^*}{r} - k\eta^* \right)^2 \right. \\ & \left. + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + 2k\eta^* \right)^2 + (\eta^{*'} + k\xi^*)^2 \right] r dr \\ & + 2\pi^2 \delta \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} - k\eta^* \right)^2 r dr \leq C. \end{aligned}$$

Therefore, the energy takes as follows:

$$\begin{aligned}
\tilde{E}(\xi^*) &= E_{0,k} \left(\xi^*, \frac{1}{kr} \left((r\xi^*)' - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{\gamma p + B_\theta^2} \xi^* \right), 0 \right) \\
&= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \\
&\quad \times \xi^{*2} r dr + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \tilde{\varepsilon} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} - k\eta^* \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} - \frac{2\xi^*}{r} - k\eta^* \right)^2 \right. \\
&\quad \left. + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + 2k\eta^* \right)^2 + (\eta^{*'} + k\xi^*)^2 \right] r dr \\
&\quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \tilde{\delta} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} - k\eta^* \right)^2 r dr \\
&\leq 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \xi^{*2} r dr + sC.
\end{aligned}$$

Then, there exists $s_0 > 0$ such that $s \leq s_0$,

$$\tilde{E}(\xi^*) \leq \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \xi^{*2} r dr < 0,$$

which implies the result. $\square$

We now deduce the existence of a minimizer of $E_{0,k}$ on the set $\mathcal{A}_1$.

Proposition 3.3. *The energy $E_{0,k}$ achieves its infimum on the set $\mathcal{A}_1$.*

Proof. First note that $E_{0,k}$ is bounded below on the set $\mathcal{A}_1$. Let $(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n) \in \mathcal{A}_1$ be a minimizing sequence. Then, we know that (ξ_n, η_n, ζ_n) is bounded in X_k , so up to the extraction of a subsequence $\psi_n = |B_\theta| [k\eta_n - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi_n)' - 2\xi_n)] r^{\frac{1}{2}} \rightharpoonup \psi = |B_\theta| [k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi)] r^{\frac{1}{2}}$ weakly in L^2 , and $\xi_n \rightarrow \xi$, $\eta_n \rightarrow \eta$ and $\zeta_n \rightarrow \zeta$ strongly in L^2 from the compactness results in Proposition [3.1](#).

By weak lower semi-continuity, since $\psi_n \rightharpoonup \psi$ in the space $L^2(0, r_0)$, we have

$$\int_0^{r_0} B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right]^2 r dr \leq \liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_0^{r_0} B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta_n - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi_n)' - 2\xi_n) \right]^2 r dr.$$

Because of the quadratic structure of all the terms in the integrals defining $E_{0,k}$, similarly by weak lower semicontinuity and strong L^2 convergence, we get that

$$E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \leq \liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} E_{0,k}(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n) = \inf_{\mathcal{A}_1} E_{0,k}.$$

All that remains is to show that $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1$. By the compactness results in Proposition 3.1 when $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, we can prove up to subsequence $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \mathcal{J}(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n) = \mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) = 1$, which implies that $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1$. $\square$

We now prove that the minimizer constructed in the previous result satisfies Euler–Lagrange equations equivalent to (3.11) with $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$.

Proposition 3.4. *Let $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1$ be the minimizer of $E_{0,k}$ constructed in Proposition 3.3. Then (ξ, η, ζ) are smooth when restricted to $(0, r_0)$ and satisfy*

$$\begin{pmatrix} \frac{d}{dr} \frac{\gamma p + B_\theta^2}{r} \frac{d}{dr} r - r \left(\frac{B_\theta^2}{r^2} \right)' & -\frac{d}{dr} k(\gamma p + B_\theta^2) - \frac{2kB_\theta^2}{r} & 0 \\ \frac{k(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)}{r} \frac{d}{dr} r - \frac{2kB_\theta^2}{r} & -k^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2) & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix} + \begin{pmatrix} \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d^2}{dr^2} & -\left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} & 0 \\ + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{1}{r} - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 & & \\ \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{k}{r} & \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r} \frac{d}{dr} & 0 \\ & -\left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k^2 & \\ 0 & 0 & \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d}{dr} \frac{1}{r} - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix} = -\rho \lambda \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix}, \quad (3.35)$$

along with the interface boundary conditions

$$\begin{aligned} & [B_\theta^2 \xi - B_\theta^2 \xi' r + kB_\theta^2 \eta r] n \\ & + \tilde{\varepsilon} (-2\xi' r, i\zeta' r - i\zeta, -i\eta' r - ik\xi r)^T \\ & - \left(\tilde{\delta} - \frac{2}{3} \tilde{\varepsilon} \right) [\xi' r + \xi - k\eta r] n = 0, \quad \text{at } r = r_0. \end{aligned} \quad (3.36)$$

Proof. Since we want to use the structure of the energy and properties of functional space, we first change the spectral formula (3.35) into the following equations by a

simple computation

$$\left\{ \begin{aligned} & -\frac{d}{dr} \left\{ \gamma p \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' \right] \right\} - \frac{d}{dr} \left\{ B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] \right\} \\ & + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d^2}{dr^2} \xi + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{\xi}{r} - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \xi - \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} \eta \\ & - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{r} \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] - \frac{2p'\xi}{r} = -\rho\lambda\xi, \\ & -k(\gamma p + B_\theta^2) \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' + \frac{2B_\theta^2}{r(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \xi \right] \\ & + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} \xi + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{k\xi}{r} \\ & + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} \eta + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r} \frac{d}{dr} \eta - \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k^2 \eta = -\rho\lambda\eta, \\ & \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} \zeta + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d}{dr} \frac{\zeta}{r} - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \zeta = -\rho\lambda\zeta. \end{aligned} \right. \quad (3.37)$$

Next, we prove the minimization ξ , η and ζ satisfy Eqs. (3.37) in weak sense on $(0, r_0)$.

Fix $(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0) \in X_k$ (see (3.13)). Define

$$j(t, \tau(t)) = \mathcal{J}(\xi + t\xi_0 + \tau(t)\xi, \eta + t\eta_0 + \tau(t)\eta, \zeta + t\zeta_0 + \tau(t)\zeta)$$

and note that $j(0, 0) = 1$. Moreover, j is smooth,

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{\partial j}{\partial t}(0, 0) &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} 2\rho(\xi_0\xi + \eta_0\eta + \zeta_0\zeta)rdr, \\ \frac{\partial j}{\partial \tau}(0, 0) &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} 2\rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2)rdr = 2. \end{aligned}$$

So, by the inverse function theorem, we can solve for $\tau = \tau(t)$ in a neighborhood of 0 as a C^1 function of t so that $\tau(0) = 0$ and $j(t, \tau(t)) = 1$. We may differentiate the last equation to find

$$\frac{\partial j}{\partial t}(0, 0) + \frac{\partial j}{\partial \tau}(0, 0)\tau'(0) = 0,$$

which gives that

$$\tau'(0) = -\frac{1}{2} \frac{\partial j}{\partial t}(0, 0) = -2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi_0\xi + \eta_0\eta + \zeta_0\zeta)rdr.$$

Since (ξ, η, ζ) is the minimizer over the set $\mathcal{A}_1$, we may make variations with respect to (ξ_0, η_0, ζ_0) to find that

$$0 = \frac{d}{dt} \Big|_{t=0} E_{0,k}(\xi + t\xi_0 + \tau(t)\xi, \eta + t\eta_0 + \tau(t)\eta, \zeta + t\zeta_0 + \tau(t)\zeta),$$

which together with (3.27) and (3.28), implies that

$$\begin{aligned}
 0 = & 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} 2p' \xi \xi_0 dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] \\
 & \times \left\{ -\frac{1}{r}[(r\xi_0)' - 2\xi_0] \right\} r dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' - k\eta \right] (r\xi_0)' dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k B_\theta^2 \\
 & \times \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] \eta_0 r dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' - k\eta \right] (-k\eta_0) r dr \\
 & + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} \left(-\xi' \xi_0 - \xi \xi_0' + \frac{2\xi \xi_0}{r} \right) + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \xi' \xi_0' r + \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \xi \xi_0 r \right. \\
 & + \tilde{\delta} \left(\xi' \xi_0 + \xi \xi_0' + \frac{\xi \xi_0}{r} \right) \left. \right] dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta \xi_0' r + \left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta \xi_0 \right. \\
 & + \tilde{\varepsilon} \eta' k \xi_0 r \left. \right] dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \zeta \zeta_0 r - \tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta' \zeta_0 - \tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta \zeta_0' + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{\zeta \zeta_0}{r} + \tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta' \zeta_0' r \right] dr \\
 & + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k \xi' \eta_0 r + \left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k \xi \eta_0 + \tilde{\varepsilon} k \xi \eta_0' r \right] dr \\
 & + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k^2 \eta \eta_0 r + \tilde{\varepsilon} \eta' \eta_0' r \right] dr + 2\tau'(0)\lambda.
 \end{aligned}$$

Since ξ_0 , η_0 and ζ_0 are independent, one has the triplet of equations

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \int_0^{r_0} 2p' \xi \xi_0 dr - \int_0^{r_0} B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] [(r\xi_0)' - 2\xi_0] dr \\
 & + \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} \left(-\xi' \xi_0 - \xi \xi_0' + \frac{2\xi \xi_0}{r} \right) + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \xi' \xi_0' r + \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \xi \xi_0 r \right. \\
 & + \tilde{\delta} \left(\xi' \xi_0 + \xi \xi_0' + \frac{\xi \xi_0}{r} \right) \left. \right] dr + \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta \xi_0' r + \left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta \xi_0 \right. \\
 & + \tilde{\varepsilon} \eta' k \xi_0 r \left. \right] dr + \int_0^{r_0} \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' - k\eta \right] (r\xi_0)' dr = \int_0^{r_0} \rho \lambda \xi_0 \xi r dr, \quad (3.38)
 \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \int_0^{r_0} k B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] \eta_0 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \gamma p k \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' \right] \eta_0 r dr \\
 & + \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k \xi' \eta_0 r + \left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k \xi \eta_0 + \tilde{\varepsilon} k \xi \eta_0' r \right] dr \\
 & + \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k^2 \eta \eta_0 r + \tilde{\varepsilon} \eta' \eta_0' r \right] dr = \int_0^{r_0} \rho \lambda \eta_0 \eta r dr, \quad (3.39)
 \end{aligned}$$

$$\int_0^{r_0} \left(\tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \zeta \zeta_0 r - \tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta' \zeta_0 - \tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta \zeta_0' + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{\zeta \zeta_0}{r} + \tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta' \zeta_0' r \right) dr = \int_0^{r_0} \rho \lambda \zeta_0 \zeta r dr. \quad (3.40)$$

So ξ , η and ζ satisfy (3.37) in a weak sense on $(0, r_0)$, if (ξ_0, η_0, ζ_0) are chosen compactly supported in $(0, r_0)$. Now we prove that the interface boundary conditions (3.36) are satisfied. From Eqs. (3.37), we get

 & + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{\xi}{r} - \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} \eta - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \xi + \frac{2\gamma p \xi'}{r} \\
 & + \frac{2\gamma p' \xi}{r} - \frac{2\gamma p \xi}{r^2} - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{r} \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] - \frac{2p' \xi}{r} = -\rho \lambda \xi, \\
 & \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} \eta + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r} \frac{d}{dr} \eta + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k \frac{d}{dr} \xi + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \frac{k\xi}{r} - \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k^2 \eta \\
 & - k(\gamma p + B_\theta^2) \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' + \frac{2B_\theta^2}{r(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \xi \right] = -\rho \lambda \eta, \\
 & \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} \zeta + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r} \frac{d}{dr} \zeta - \tilde{\varepsilon} k^2 \zeta = -\rho \lambda \zeta.
 \end{aligned} \tag{3.41}$$

From $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k$ and the compactness results in Proposition 3.1 we deduce that $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in H^1(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0) \times H^1(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0) \times H^1(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0)$ when $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, which gives that

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \frac{d}{dr} \left\{ (\gamma p + B_\theta^2) \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} \right) - \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta \right\} \\
 & \in L^2 \left(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0 \right), \\
 & \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{d^2}{dr^2} \eta + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r} \frac{d}{dr} \eta \in L^2 \left(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0 \right), \frac{d}{dr} \left(\tilde{\varepsilon} \zeta' + \tilde{\varepsilon} \frac{\zeta}{r} \right) \in L^2(0, r_0).
 \end{aligned}$$

Hence $(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi)] + (\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta})(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r}) - (\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta})k\eta$, $\tilde{\varepsilon}\eta' + \frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{r}\eta$ and $\tilde{\varepsilon}\zeta' + \tilde{\varepsilon}\frac{\zeta}{r}$ are well-defined at the endpoint $r = r_0$. Make variations with respect to $(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0) \in C_c^\infty((0, r_0]) \times C_c^\infty((0, r_0]) \times C_c^\infty((0, r_0])$. Integrating the terms in (3.38)–(3.40) by parts and using that (ξ, η, ζ) solve Eqs. (3.37) on $(0, r_0)$, we get that

$$\begin{aligned}
 & -B_\theta^2 \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right] (r\xi_0) \Big|_{r=r_0} + \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r}(r\xi)' - k\eta \right] (r\xi_0) \Big|_{r=r_0} \\
 & \left[-\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3}\xi\xi_0 + \tilde{\delta}\xi\xi_0 + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \xi'\xi_0 r + \left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta\xi_0 r \right] \Big|_{r=r_0} = 0, \\
 & (\tilde{\varepsilon}k\xi\eta_0 r + \tilde{\varepsilon}\eta'\eta_0 r) \Big|_{r=r_0} = 0, \quad (\tilde{\varepsilon}\zeta'\zeta_0 r - \tilde{\varepsilon}\zeta\zeta_0) \Big|_{r=r_0} = 0.
 \end{aligned} \tag{3.42}$$

Since the test functions ξ_0 , η_0 and ζ_0 may be chosen arbitrarily, by the pressure $p = 0$ on the boundary $r = r_0$, we get the interface boundary conditions

$$-B_\theta^2[k\eta r - \xi' r + \xi]|_{r=r_0} + \left[\left(\tilde{\delta} - \frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} \right) (\xi - k\eta r + \xi' r) + 2\tilde{\varepsilon}\xi' r \right] \Big|_{r=r_0} = 0, \quad (3.43)$$

$$(\tilde{\varepsilon}k\xi r + \tilde{\varepsilon}\eta' r)|_{r=r_0} = 0, \quad (\tilde{\varepsilon}\zeta' r - \tilde{\varepsilon}\zeta)|_{r=r_0} = 0,$$

which ensures that (3.36) holds. We finish the proof. $\square$

Next, we establish the continuity and monotonicity properties of the eigenvalue $\lambda(s)$.

Proposition 3.5. *Let $\lambda : (0, \infty) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be given by (3.27). Then the following hold:*

- (i) $\lambda \in C_{\text{loc}}^{0,1}((0, \infty))$, and $\lambda \in C^0((0, \infty))$.
- (ii) There exists a positive constant $C_2 = C_2(r_0, p, \varepsilon, \delta, k)$ so that

$$\lambda(s) \geq -C + sC_2. \quad (3.44)$$

- (iii) $\lambda(s)$ is strictly increasing.

Proof. Fix a compact interval $Q = [a, b] \subset (0, \infty)$, and fix $(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0) \in \mathcal{A}_1$. We can decompose $E_{0,k}$ as follows:

$$E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta; s) = E_{0,k}^0(\xi, \eta, \zeta) + sE_{0,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta), \quad (3.45)$$

with

$$\begin{aligned} E_{0,k}^0(\xi, \eta, \zeta) &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left\{ \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \xi^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + (\gamma p + B_\theta^2) \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r}((r\xi)' - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{\gamma p + B_\theta^2}\xi) \right]^2 \right\} r dr, \end{aligned} \quad (3.46)$$

$$\begin{aligned} E_{0,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta) &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \varepsilon \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + 2k\eta \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 + k^2\zeta^2 \right] r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \delta \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} - k\eta \right)^2 r dr. \end{aligned} \quad (3.47)$$

The non-negativity of $E_{0,k}^1$ implies that $E_{0,k}$ is non-decreasing in s with $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1$ kept fixed. By Proposition 3.3 for each $s \in (0, \infty)$ we can find $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1$ so that

$$E_{0,k}(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s; s) = \inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1} E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta; s) = \lambda(s).$$

From the non-negativity of $E_{0,k}^1$, the minimality of (ξ_s, η_s, ζ_s) and for $0 < s_0 < r_0$

$$E_{0,k}^0(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \geq \pi^2 \int_{s_0}^{r_0} \gamma p \left| \frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' \right|^2 r dr - 3C\mathcal{J} \geq -3C\mathcal{J}, \quad (3.48)$$

which can be proved from Lemma 3.10 of Ref. [1] using Lemma [3.9] we have

$$E_{0,k}(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0; b) \geq E_{0,k}(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0; s) \geq E_{0,k}(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s; s) \geq sE_{0,k}^1(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s) - C,$$

for all $s \in Q$. This implies that there exists a constant

$$0 < K = K(a, b, \xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0, \pi, p) < \infty$$

so that

$$\sup_{s \in Q} E_{0,k}^1(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s) \leq K. \quad (3.49)$$

Let $s_i \in Q$ for $i = 1, 2$. Using the minimality of $(\xi_{s_1}, \eta_{s_1}, \zeta_{s_1})$ compared to $(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2})$, we have

$$\lambda(s_1) = E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_1}, \eta_{s_1}, \zeta_{s_1}; s_1) \leq E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}; s_1), \quad (3.50)$$

which together with [3.45] gives that

$$\begin{aligned} E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}; s_1) &\leq E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}; s_2) + |s_1 - s_2| E_{0,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) \\ &= \lambda(s_2) + |s_1 - s_2| E_{0,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}). \end{aligned} \quad (3.51)$$

Combining [3.49]–[3.51], we get that $\lambda(s_1) \leq \lambda(s_2) + K|s_1 - s_2|$, which implies that (i) holds.

Now, we prove (ii). Note that [3.48] and the non-negativity of $E_{0,k}^1$ imply that

$$\lambda(s) \geq s \inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}} E_{0,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta) - C,$$

where we denote the constant $C_2 = \inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}} E_{0,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta)$ and this constant is positive.

Finally, we show (iii). Notice that if $0 < s_1 < s_2 < \infty$, then the decomposition [3.45] ensures that

$$\begin{aligned} \lambda(s_1) &= E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_1}, \eta_{s_1}, \zeta_{s_1}; s_1) \leq E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}; s_1) \\ &\leq E_{0,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}; s_2) = \lambda(s_2). \end{aligned}$$

So λ is non-decreasing in s . Suppose by way of contradiction that $\lambda(s_1) = \lambda(s_2)$. Then, the above inequality implies that $s_1 E_{0,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) = s_2 E_{0,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2})$, which gives that $E_{0,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) = 0$. This in turn implies $\xi_{s_2} = \eta_{s_2} = \zeta_{s_2} = 0$, which contradicts that $(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) \in \mathcal{A}_1$. Therefore, the equality cannot be achieved, and λ is strictly increasing in s . $\square$

Remark 3.1. Define the open set $\mathcal{S} = \lambda^{-1}(-\infty, 0) \subset (0, \infty)$, then we calculate $\mu = \sqrt{-\lambda} > 0$. The open set $\mathcal{S}$ is nonempty by Proposition [3.2]

From Proposition 3.2 and lower bound (3.44), we can show the uniqueness of s .

Proposition 3.6. *There exists a unique $s \in \mathcal{S}$ so that $\mu(s) = \sqrt{-\lambda} > 0$ and $s = \mu(s)$.*

Proof. From Proposition 3.2 we know that there exist two constants $C_0 > 0$ and $C_1 > 0$ such that $\lambda(s) \leq -C_0 + sC_1$. On the other hand, the lower bound (3.44) implies that $\lambda(s) \rightarrow +\infty$, as $s \rightarrow \infty$. Since λ is continuous and strictly increasing, there exists $s^* \in (0, \infty)$ so that

$$\mathcal{S} = \lambda^{-1}((-\infty, 0)) = (0, s^*).$$

Since $\lambda < 0$, on $\mathcal{S}$, we can define $\mu = \sqrt{-\lambda(s)}$. Now, we define the function $\Phi : (0, s^*) \rightarrow (0, \infty)$ according to $\Phi(s) = \frac{s}{\mu(s)}$. So Φ is continuous and strictly increasing in s from the continuity and monotonicity properties of λ . Moreover, we know that $\lim_{s \rightarrow 0} \Phi(s) = 0$ and $\lim_{s \rightarrow s^*} \Phi(s) = +\infty$. By the intermediate value theorem, there exists $s \in (0, s^*)$ so that $\Phi(s) = 1$, that is, $s = \mu(s)$. This s is unique since Φ is strictly increasing. $\square$

Now, we consider the regularity of ξ , η and ζ .

Proposition 3.7. *Let (ξ, η, ζ) be the solutions to (3.35) or (3.37), then there exists A_n such that*

$$\begin{aligned} \|\xi^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \\ \|\eta^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \\ \|\zeta^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \end{aligned}$$

with A_n depending on r_0 , k , π and the pressure p .

Proof. Applying $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k$ and the compactness results in Proposition 3.1 when $m = 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, we can get that $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in L^2(0, r_0)$ and $(\sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\eta', \sqrt{r}\zeta', \frac{\xi}{\sqrt{r}}, \frac{\zeta}{\sqrt{r}}) \in L^2(0, r_0)$. From the system (3.37), we have

$$\begin{aligned} \|\xi'' r^{3/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C \left\| \left(\xi, \eta, \sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\eta', \frac{\xi}{\sqrt{r}} \right) \right\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}, \\ \|\eta'' r^{3/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C \left\| \left(\xi, \eta, \sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\eta', \frac{\xi}{\sqrt{r}} \right) \right\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}, \\ \|\zeta'' r^{3/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C \left\| \left(\frac{\zeta}{\sqrt{r}}, \sqrt{r}\zeta' \right) \right\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}. \end{aligned}$$

By induction on n . Suppose for some $n \geq 1$,

$$\begin{aligned} \|\xi^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \\ \|\eta^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \\ \|\zeta^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n. \end{aligned}$$

By Remark 3.1 then differentiating (3.37), we get that there exists a constant C depending on the various parameters so that

$$\begin{aligned}\|\xi^{(n+1)} r^{(2n+1)/2}\|_{L^2(0,r_0)} &\leq C A_n \leq A_{n+1}, \\ \|\eta^{(n+1)} r^{(2n+1)/2}\|_{L^2(0,r_0)} &\leq C A_n \leq A_{n+1}, \\ \|\zeta^{(n+1)} r^{(2n+1)/2}\|_{L^2(0,r_0)} &\leq C A_n \leq A_{n+1}.\end{aligned}$$

Then, the bound holds for $n+1$, and so by induction the bound holds for all $n \geq 1$. $\square$

3.3. Modified variational problem when $m \neq 0$

In this subsection, we will first introduce the definition of function space $Y_{m,k}$ and its properties, then prove the instability for any $m \neq 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$.

First, let us introduce the definition of the space $Y_{m,k}$.

Definition 3.2. The weighted Sobolev space $Y_{m,k}$ is defined as the completion of $\{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in C^\infty([0, r_0]) \times C^\infty([0, r_0]) \times C^\infty([0, r_0]) | \xi(0) = \eta(0) = \zeta(0) = 0\}$, with respect to the norm

$$\begin{aligned}\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{Y_{m,k}}^2 &= \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 + \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - \frac{2m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ &\quad + \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta + 2k\eta \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 \\ &\quad + \left. \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta \right)^2 \right] r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr \\ &\quad + \int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr.\end{aligned}\tag{3.52}$$

Applying Definition 3.2, Lemmas 3.6 and 3.7 similarly as Proposition 3.1 we can get the following compactness results.

Proposition 3.8. Let π_i for $i = 1, 2, 3$ denote the projection operator onto the i th factor. Then $\pi_i : Y_{m,k} \rightarrow Z_i$ is a bounded, linear, compact map for $i = 1, 2, 3$, with the spaces Z_1, Z_2 and Z_3 in (3.16). We denote them by $Y_{m,k} \subset\subset Z_i$ for $i = 1, 2, 3$.

Now, we consider the case $m \neq 0$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$. We need to consider the energy (2.27) and (3.24).

First, we can show that $E_{m,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are well defined on the space $Y_{m,k} \times H^1(r_0, r_w)$.

Lemma 3.11. $E_{m,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are well defined on the space $Y_{m,k} \times H^1(r_0, r_w)$.

Proof. By Lemma 3.6 and Proposition 3.8, similar to the proof of (3.25), we also have by Definition 3.2 that

$$\left| \int_0^{r_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| \leq C\mathcal{J} + C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{Y_{m,k}}^2, \quad (3.53)$$

which implies that

$$\begin{aligned} & |E(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r)| \\ & \leq C\mathcal{J} + C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{Y_{m,k}}^2 + C \int_0^{r_0} B_\theta^2 \left[\frac{\eta}{r} - \frac{k}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} ((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right]^2 r dr \\ & \quad + C \int_0^{r_0} p \left[\frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' + \frac{m\xi}{r} \right]^2 r dr + C \int_0^{r_0} \frac{B_\theta^2}{r} \xi^2 dr + C \int_0^{r_0} \frac{B_\theta^2}{r} (\xi - r\xi')^2 dr \\ & \quad + C \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 + \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - \frac{2m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ & \quad \left. + \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta + 2k\eta \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi \right)^2 \right. \\ & \quad \left. + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 + \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\zeta \right)^2 \right] r dr + C \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr \\ & \quad + C\|\widehat{Q}_r\|_{H^1(r_0, r_w)} + C\|\rho\|_{L^\infty}^{\gamma-1} \int_0^{r_0} \rho |\eta|^2 r dr \\ & \leq C\|(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_{Y_{m,k}}^2 + C\|\widehat{Q}_r\|_{H^1(r_0, r_w)}. \end{aligned}$$

Therefore, $E_{m,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are well defined on the space $Y_{m,k} \times H^1(r_0, r_w)$. $\square$

Consider the set

$$\mathcal{A}_2 = \left\{ ((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in Y_{m,k} \times H^1(r_0, r_w) \mid \mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) = 1, \right. \\ \left. m\widehat{B}_\theta \xi = r\widehat{Q}_r \text{ at } r = r_0 \text{ and } \widehat{Q}_r = 0 \text{ at } r = r_w \right\}, \quad (3.54)$$

where the functions ξ , η and ζ are restricted to $(0, r_0)$, and the function $\widehat{Q}_r$ is restricted to (r_0, r_w) . Then, we write

$$\lambda(s) := \inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2} E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r; s). \quad (3.55)$$

We want to show that the infimum of $E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r)$ over the set $\mathcal{A}_2$ is achieved and is negative and that the minimizer solves (3.11) and (3.12) with the corresponding boundary conditions. First, we prove that the energy $E_{m,k}$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$ and the coercivity estimate holds.

Lemma 3.12. *The energy $E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r)$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$ and any minimizing sequence is bounded in $Y_{m,k}$.*

Proof. Similarly as (3.29), we can get from (2.27) that for any $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2$,

$$E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) \geq 2\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 4\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} p' \xi^2 dr. \quad (3.56)$$

By Lemma 3.6 choosing $0 < s_0 < \frac{r_0}{3}$ small enough such that $Cs_0 \leq \frac{1}{4}$, similarly as (3.30) we deduce that

$$\left| \int_0^{s_0} p' \xi^2 dr \right| \leq C\mathcal{J}s_0 + \frac{1}{2}\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr.$$

On the other hand, from the definition of $\mathcal{J}$ and Lemma 3.7 choosing $\frac{r_0}{3} < s_1 < r_0$ close enough to r_0 such that $C(r_0 - s_1) \leq \frac{1}{4}$, we can prove

$$\left| \int_{s_0}^{s_1} p' \xi^2 dr \right| \leq C \int_{s_0}^{s_1} \xi^2 dr \leq C\mathcal{J}$$

and

$$\begin{aligned} & \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \xi^2(r) dr \\ & \leq C \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{\frac{r_0}{2}} |\xi(b)|^2 db \right) dr + C \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^r |\xi'|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \right) \\ & \quad \times \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} - \ln(r_0 - r) \right| dr \\ & \leq C\mathcal{J}(r_0 - s_1) + C \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \right) \int_{s_1}^{r_0} \left| \ln \frac{2r_0}{3} - \ln(r_0 - r) \right| dr \\ & \leq C\mathcal{J}(r_0 - s_1) + C(r_0 - s_1) \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \\ & \leq C\mathcal{J}(r_0 - s_1) + 2C(r_0 - s_1)\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr \\ & \leq C\mathcal{J}(r_0 - s_1) + \frac{1}{2}\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr, \end{aligned} \quad (3.57)$$

where we have used the facts

$$\begin{aligned} & \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 |r_0 - s| ds \\ & \leq \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 r dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 r_0 dr \leq 2C\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_{\frac{r_0}{3}}^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr \\ & \leq 2C\pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr. \end{aligned} \quad (3.58)$$

Hence, we can get

$$E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) \geq \pi^2 \min(\tilde{\varepsilon}, \tilde{\delta}) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr - 3C\mathcal{J} \geq -3C\mathcal{J}, \quad (3.59)$$

which implies that the energy $E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r)$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$. Now, we prove the coercivity estimate. Using the facts that $\mathcal{J} = 1$ and $E_{m,k}$ has a lower bound on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$, we can choose a minimizing sequence such that along the minimizing sequence, we have $M \leq E_{m,k}(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n, \widehat{Q}_{rn}) < M + 1$, and for the minimizing sequence, we can prove coercivity estimate:

$$\|(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n)\|_{Y_{m,k}}^2 + \|\widehat{Q}_{rn}\|_{H^1(r_0, r_w)} \leq C\mathcal{J} + C(M + 1) \leq C. \quad \square$$

From Lemma 3.12 and Proposition 3.8 we can show that $E_{m,k}$ achieves its infimum on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$.

Proposition 3.9. $E_{m,k}$ achieves its infimum on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$.

Proof. First from Lemma 3.12 we have that $E_{m,k}$ is bounded below on the set $\mathcal{A}_2$. Let $((\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n), \widehat{Q}_{rn}) \in \mathcal{A}_2$ be a minimizing sequence. Then (ξ_n, η_n, ζ_n) are bounded in $Y_{m,k}$ (see (3.52)), and $\widehat{Q}_{rn}$ is bounded in $H^1(r_0, r_w)$, so up to the extraction of a subsequence $\psi_n = \sqrt{m^2 + k^2 r^2} |B_\theta| [\frac{\eta_n}{r} - \frac{k}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} ((r\xi_n)' - 2\xi_n)] r^{\frac{1}{2}} \rightharpoonup \psi = \sqrt{m^2 + k^2 r^2} |B_\theta| [\frac{\eta}{r} - \frac{k}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} ((r\xi)' - 2\xi)] r^{\frac{1}{2}}$ weakly in L^2 , and $\xi_n \rightarrow \xi$, $\eta_n \rightarrow \eta$ strongly in L^2 from the compact embeddings in Proposition 3.8. By weak lower semi-continuity, since $\psi_n \rightharpoonup \psi$ in the space $L^2(0, r_0)$, we get

$$\begin{aligned} & \int_0^{r_0} (m^2 + k^2 r^2) B_\theta^2 \left[\frac{\eta}{r} - \frac{k}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} ((r\xi)' - 2\xi) \right]^2 r dr \\ & \leq \liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_0^{r_0} (m^2 + k^2 r^2) B_\theta^2 \left[\frac{\eta_n}{r} - \frac{k}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} ((r\xi_n)' - 2\xi_n) \right]^2 r dr. \end{aligned}$$

Because of the quadratic structure of all the terms in the integrals defining $E_{m,k}$, similarly dealing with the other positive terms by weak lower semi-continuity, strong $L^2(0, r_0)$ convergence in Proposition 3.8 and $\widehat{Q}_{nr} \rightarrow \widehat{Q}_r$ strongly in $L^2(r_0, r_w)$, we deduce

$$E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) \leq \liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} E_{m,k}(\xi_n, \eta_n, \zeta_n, \widehat{Q}_{rn}) = \inf_{\mathcal{A}_2} E_{m,k}.$$

All that remains is to show that $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}$. The fact that $\xi_n \rightarrow \xi$, $\eta_n \rightarrow \eta$, $\zeta_n \rightarrow \zeta$ strongly in L^2 from the compact embeddings in Proposition 3.8 implies that $\mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) = 1$, so that $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2$. We complete the proof. $\square$

We know that $\tilde{\varepsilon} = s\varepsilon$ and $\tilde{\delta} = s\delta$ are smooth, and bounded from above and below by positive quantities for fixed $s > 0$. Now, we prove the infimum of $E_{m,k}$ over the set $\mathcal{A}_2$ is negative, if there exists r^* such that $2p'(r^*) + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0$ for $m \neq 0$.

Proposition 3.10. If there exists r^* such that $2p'(r^*) + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0$ for $m \neq 0$, then for any fixed large $k = k_0$ and any fixed $m \neq 0$, there exists constant $s_0 > 0$ depending on ε, δ and k_0 so that for $s \leq s_0$, it holds that $\lambda = \inf E_{m,k} < 0$.

Proof. Since both $E_{m,k}$ and $\mathcal{J}$ are homogeneous degree 2, it suffices to show that

$$\inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in Y_{m,k} \times H^1(r_0, r_w)} \frac{E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r)}{\mathcal{J}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)} < 0.$$

Since $\mathcal{J}$ is positive definite, one may reduce to constructing $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in Y_{m,k} \times H^1(r_0, r_w)$ (see [\[3.52\]](#)), such that

$$E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) < 0.$$

From the assumption in Proposition [\[3.10\]](#), we can choose a smooth function $\xi^* \in C_c^\infty(0, r_0)$ such that

$$2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^{*2} dr < 0.$$

Then, we can assume that $\eta^* = \frac{rk(r\xi^*)' - 2rk\xi^*}{m^2 + k^2 r^2}$ and $\zeta^* = \frac{r}{m}(k\eta^* - \frac{1}{r}(r\xi^*)')$, such that the first and second terms of $E_{m,k}(\xi^*, \eta^*, \zeta^*, \widehat{Q}_r)$ in [\[2.27\]](#) vanish, that is,

$$2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (m^2 + k^2 r^2) \left[\frac{B_\theta}{r} \eta^* + \frac{-kB_\theta(r\xi^*)' + 2kB_\theta\xi^*}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} \right]^2 r dr = 0,$$

$$2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r}(r\xi^*)' - k\eta^* + \frac{m\zeta^*}{r} \right]^2 r dr = 0.$$

Here, ξ^* , η^* and ζ^* are smooth functions and belong to the space $Y_{m,k}$.

Fix $k = k_0$ large enough and fix $m = m_0$, and choose $\widehat{Q}_r = 0$ so that

$$2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r(m^2 + k^2 r^2)} (\xi^* - r\xi^{*'})^2 dr \leq -\frac{1}{2}\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^{*2} dr,$$

$$2\pi^2 \int_{r_0}^{r_w} \left[|\widehat{Q}_r|^2 + \frac{1}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} |(r\widehat{Q}_r')|^2 \right] r dr = 0,$$

and from $\xi^* \in C_c^\infty(0, r_0)$, $\eta^* = \frac{rk(r\xi^*)' - 2rk\xi^*}{m^2 + k^2 r^2}$ and $\zeta^* = \frac{r}{m}(k\eta^* - \frac{1}{r}(r\xi^*)')$, we know that

$$\begin{aligned} & 2\pi^2 \varepsilon \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta^* - k\eta^* \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} - \frac{2\xi^*}{r} - \frac{2m}{r}\zeta^* - k\eta^* \right)^2 \right. \\ & \quad + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta^* + 2k\eta^* \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta^{*'} + \frac{\zeta^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi^* \right)^2 \\ & \quad \left. + (\eta^{*'} + k\xi^*)^2 + \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta^* - k\zeta^* \right)^2 \right] r dr + 2\pi^2 \delta \int_0^{r_0} \\ & \quad \times \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta^* - k\eta^* \right)^2 r dr \leq C. \end{aligned}$$

Therefore, we get for $k = k_0$ and $m = m_0$ that

 &\quad + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta^* + 2k\eta^* \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta^{*'} + \frac{\zeta^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi^* \right)^2 + (\eta^{*'} + k\xi^*)^2 \\
 &\quad \left. + \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta^* - k\zeta^* \right)^2 \right] r dr + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \tilde{\delta} \left(\xi^{*'} + \frac{\xi^*}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta^* - k\eta^* \right)^2 r dr \\
 &\quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r(m^2 + k^2 r^2)} (\xi^* - r\xi^{*'})^2 dr + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^{*2} dr \\
 &\quad + 2\pi^2 \int_{r_0}^{r_w} g \left[|\hat{Q}_r^*|^2 + \frac{1}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} |(r\hat{Q}_r^*)'|^2 \right] r dr \\
 &\leq sC + \frac{3}{2}\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^{*2} dr.
 \end{aligned}$$

Then there exists $s_0 > 0$ depending on ε , δ and k_0 , so that $s \leq s_0$, it holds that

$$\tilde{E}(\xi^*) \leq \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^{*2} dr < 0,$$

which implies the result. $\square$

We now prove that the minimizer constructed in the previous result satisfies Euler–Lagrange equations equivalent to (3.11) and (3.12) with suitable boundary conditions.

Proposition 3.11. *Let $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \hat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2$ be the minimizer of $E_{m,k}$ constructed in Proposition 3.9. Then (ξ, η, ζ) are smooth in $(0, r_0)$ and satisfy*

 & \times \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix} + \begin{pmatrix} a_{11} & a_{12} & a_{13} \\ a_{21} & a_{22} & a_{23} \\ a_{31} & a_{32} & a_{33} \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix} = -\rho \lambda \begin{pmatrix} \xi \\ \eta \\ \zeta \end{pmatrix}, \tag{3.60}
 \end{aligned}$$

with

$$\begin{aligned}
 a_{11} &= \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta}\right) \frac{d^2}{dr^2} + \left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta}\right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{1}{r} - \tilde{\varepsilon} \left(\frac{m^2}{r^2} + k^2\right), \quad a_{12} = -\left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta}\right) k \frac{d}{dr}, \\
 a_{13} &= \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta}\right) \frac{d}{dr} \frac{m}{r} - \frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}m}{r^2}, \quad a_{21} = \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta}\right) k \frac{d}{dr} + \left(\frac{\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta}\right) \frac{k}{r}, \\

The solution $\hat{Q}_r$ is smooth on (r_0, r_w) and satisfies

$$\left[\frac{r}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (r \hat{Q}_r)' \right]' - \hat{Q}_r = 0, \quad (3.61)$$

with the other two components $\hat{Q}_\theta = -\frac{m}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (r \hat{Q}_r)'$ and $\hat{Q}_z = -\frac{kr}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (r \hat{Q}_r)'$. Moreover, the solution (ξ, η, ζ) and $\hat{Q}_r$ satisfy the interface boundary conditions

Proof. Fix $((\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0), q_r) \in Y_{m,k} \times H_0^1(r_0, r_w)$ (see [\(3.52\)](#)), and satisfy $m \hat{B}_\theta \xi_0 = r q_r$ on the boundary $r = r_0$ and $q_r = 0$ on the boundary $r = r_w$.

Define

$$j(t, \tau) = \mathcal{J}(\xi + t \xi_0 + \tau \xi, \eta + t \eta_0 + \tau \eta, \zeta + t \zeta_0 + \tau \zeta)$$

and note that $j(0, 0) = 1$. Moreover, j is smooth,

 \end{aligned}$$

So, by the inverse function theorem, we can solve for $\tau = \tau(t)$ in a neighborhood of 0 as a C^1 function of t so that $\tau(0) = 0$ and $j(t, \tau(t)) = 1$. We may differentiate the last equation to find

By making variation with ξ_0 , η_0 and ζ_0 compactly supported in $(0, r_0)$, and make variation q_r compactly supported in (r_0, r_w) , one gets that ξ , η and ζ satisfy (3.60) in a weak sense in $(0, r_0)$ and $\widehat{Q}_r$ solves (3.61) in a weak sense in (r_0, r_w) .

Now we show that the interface boundary conditions (3.62) are satisfied. Since from Proposition 3.8, we know that $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in L^2(0, r_0) \times L^2(0, r_0) \times L^2(0, r_0)$, which together with $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in Y_{m,k}$ (see (3.52)), gives that $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in H^1(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0) \times H^1(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0) \times H^1(\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0)$. We make variations with respect to ξ_0 , η_0 and $\zeta_0 \in C_c^\infty(0, r_0]$, $q_r \in C_c^\infty[r_0, r_w)$. Integrating the terms in (3.63)–(3.65) with derivatives

of ξ_0 , q_r , η_0 and ζ_0 by parts, using ξ , η and ζ solve the system (3.60) on $(0, r_0)$ and $\widehat{Q}_r$ solves (3.61) on (r_0, r_w) , we get that

$$\begin{aligned} & \left[B_\theta^2 \left(\frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' - k\eta - \frac{2\xi}{r} \right) (r\xi_0) \right]_{r=r_0} + \left[\gamma p \left(\frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' - k\eta + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right) (r\xi_0) \right]_{r=r_0} \\ & - \left[\frac{r}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (rQ_r)' r \widehat{q}_r \right]_{r=r_0} + \left[\left(\frac{4\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} + \tilde{\delta} \right) \xi' \xi_0 r + \left(\tilde{\delta} - \frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} \right) \xi \xi_0 \right. \\ & \left. + \left(\tilde{\delta} - \frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} \right) m\zeta \xi_0 + \left(\frac{2\tilde{\varepsilon}}{3} - \tilde{\delta} \right) k\eta \xi_0 r \right]_{r=r_0} = 0, \end{aligned}$$

$$\tilde{\varepsilon}(\eta' r + k\xi r)\eta_0 = 0, \quad \tilde{\varepsilon}(\zeta' r - \zeta - m\xi)\zeta_0 = 0.$$

Since ξ_0 , η_0 , ζ_0 and q_r may be chosen arbitrarily, and q_r satisfies $m\widehat{B}_\theta \xi_0 = r q_r$ on the boundary $r = r_0$, using $B_\theta^2(r\xi)' = B_\theta^2 \xi + B_\theta \xi' r$ and $\widehat{Q}_\theta = -\frac{m}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} (r\widehat{Q}_r)'$, we deduce the interface boundary conditions (3.62). This proves the result. $\square$

Now, we establish the continuity and monotonicity properties of the eigenvalue $\lambda(s)$.

Proposition 3.12. *Let $\lambda : (0, \infty) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be given by (3.55). Then the following hold:*

- (i) $\lambda \in C_{\text{loc}}^{0,1}((0, \infty))$, and $\lambda \in C^0((0, \infty))$.
- (ii) *There exists a positive constant $C_3 = C_3(r_0, \mathbb{J}_z, \varepsilon, \delta, m, k)$ so that*

$$\lambda(s) \geq -C + sC_3. \quad (3.66)$$

- (iii) $\lambda(s)$ is strictly increasing.

Proof. Fix a compact interval $Q = [a, b] \subset \subset (0, \infty)$, and fix any $((\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0), \widehat{Q}_{r_0}) \in \mathcal{A}_2$. We can decompose $E_{m,k}$ as follows:

$$E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r; s) = E_{m,k}^0(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) + sE_{m,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta), \quad (3.67)$$

with

$$\begin{aligned} & E_{m,k}^0(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) \\ & = 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left\{ (m^2 + k^2 r^2) \left[\frac{B_\theta}{r} \eta + \frac{-kB_\theta(r\xi)' + 2kB_\theta \xi}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} \right]^2 \right. \\ & \quad \left. + \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' - k\eta + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right]^2 \right\} r dr + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r(m^2 + k^2 r^2)} (\xi - r\xi')^2 dr \\ & \quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^2 dr + 2\pi^2 \int_{r_0}^{r_w} g \left[|\widehat{Q}_r|^2 + \frac{1}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} |(r\widehat{Q}_r)'|^2 \right] r dr, \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
E_{m,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta) &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \varepsilon \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\
&\quad + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - \frac{2m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta + 2k\eta \right)^2 \\
&\quad + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 + \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta \right)^2 \Big] r dr \\
&\quad + 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \delta \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr > 0.
\end{aligned} \tag{3.68}$$

The non-negativity of $E_{m,k}^1$ implies that $E_{m,k}$ is non-decreasing in s with $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2$ kept fixed. By Proposition [3.9](#) for each $s \in (0, \infty)$ we can find a suit $((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2$ so that

$$E_{m,k}(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s, \widehat{Q}_{rs}; s) = \inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}} E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r; s) = \lambda(s).$$

From the non-negativity of $E_{m,k}^1$, the minimality of $(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s, \widehat{Q}_{rs})$, and for $0 < s_0 < r_0$

$$E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r) \geq \pi^2 \int_{s_0}^{r_0} \gamma p \left| \frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' \right|^2 r dr - 3C\mathcal{J} \geq -3C\mathcal{J} \tag{3.69}$$

which can be established from Lemma 3.17 of Ref. [1](#) using Lemma [3.9](#), we have

$$\begin{aligned}
E_{m,k}(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0, \widehat{Q}_{r_0}; b) &\geq E_{m,k}(\xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0, \widehat{Q}_{r_0}; s) \\
&\geq E_{m,k}(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s, \widehat{Q}_{rs}; s) \geq sE_{m,k}^1(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s) - C,
\end{aligned}$$

for all $s \in Q$. This implies that there exists a constant

$$0 < K = K(a, b, \xi_0, \eta_0, \zeta_0, \widehat{Q}_{r_0}, \pi, L, \mathbb{J}_z) < \infty$$

so that

$$\sup_{s \in Q} E_{m,k}^1(\xi_s, \eta_s, \zeta_s) \leq K. \tag{3.70}$$

Let $s_i \in Q$ for $i = 1, 2$. Using the minimality of $((\xi_{s_1}, \eta_{s_1}, \zeta_{s_1}), \widehat{Q}_{rs_1})$ compared to $((\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}), \widehat{Q}_{rs_2})$, we have

$$\lambda(s_1) = E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_1}, \eta_{s_1}, \zeta_{s_1}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_1}; s_1) \leq E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_2}; s_1), \tag{3.71}$$

which together with [\(3.67\)](#) gives that

$$\begin{aligned}
&E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_2}; s_1) \\
&\leq E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_2}; s_2) + |s_1 - s_2| E_{m,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) \\
&= \lambda(s_2) + |s_1 - s_2| E_{m,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}).
\end{aligned} \tag{3.72}$$

Combining (3.70)–(3.72), we can get $\lambda(s_1) \leq \lambda(s_2) + K|s_1 - s_2|$, which shows that (i) holds.

Now, let us prove (ii). Note that (3.69) and the non-negativity of $E_{m,k}^1$ imply that

$$\lambda(s) \geq s \inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2} E_{m,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta) - C,$$

where we denote the constant $C_3 = \inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2} E_{m,k}^1(\xi, \eta, \zeta)$ and this constant is positive.

Finally, we prove (iii). Notice that if $0 < s_1 < s_2 < \infty$, then the decomposition (3.67) ensures that

$$\begin{aligned} \lambda(s_1) &= E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_1}, \eta_{s_1}, \zeta_{s_1}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_1}; s_1) \leq E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_2}; s_1) \\ &\leq E_{m,k}(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}, \widehat{Q}_{rs_2}; s_2) = \lambda(s_2). \end{aligned}$$

So λ is non-decreasing in s . Suppose by way of contradiction that $\lambda(s_1) = \lambda(s_2)$. Then, the above inequality implies that $s_1 E_{m,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) = s_2 E_{m,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2})$, which gives that $E_{m,k}^1(\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}) = 0$. This in turn implies $\xi_{s_2} = \eta_{s_2} = \zeta_{s_2} = 0$, which contradicts that $((\xi_{s_2}, \eta_{s_2}, \zeta_{s_2}), \widehat{Q}_{rs_2}) \in \mathcal{A}_2$. Therefore, equality cannot be achieved, and λ is strictly increasing in s . $\square$

If there exists r^* such that $2p'(r^*) + \frac{m^2 B_a^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0$ for $m \neq 0$, by Proposition 3.10 we can get the existence of s .

Remark 3.2. Define the open set $\mathcal{S} = \lambda^{-1}((-\infty, 0)) \subset (0, \infty)$, then we calculate $\mu = \sqrt{-\lambda} > 0$. The open set $\mathcal{S}$ is nonempty by Proposition 3.10

If there exists r^* such that $2p'(r^*) + \frac{m^2 B_a^2(r^*)}{r^*} < 0$ for $m \neq 0$, by Proposition 3.10 we can prove the uniqueness of s on the open set $\mathcal{S}$.

Proposition 3.13. *There exists a unique $s \in \mathcal{S}$ so that $\mu(s) = \sqrt{-\lambda} > 0$ and $s = \mu(s)$.*

Proof. From Proposition 3.10 we know that there exist two constants $C_0 > 0$ and $C_1 > 0$ such that $\lambda(s) \leq -C_0 + sC_1$. On the other hand, the lower bound (3.66) implies that $\lambda(s) \rightarrow +\infty$, as $s \rightarrow \infty$. Since λ is continuous and strictly increasing, there exists $s^* \in (0, \infty)$ so that

$$\mathcal{S} = \lambda^{-1}((-\infty, 0)) = (0, s^*).$$

Since $\lambda < 0$, on the set $\mathcal{S}$, we can define $\mu = \sqrt{-\lambda(s)}$. Now, we define the function $\Phi : (0, s^*) \rightarrow (0, \infty)$ according to $\Phi(s) = \frac{s}{\mu(s)}$. So Φ is continuous and strictly increasing in s from the continuity and monotonicity properties of λ . Moreover, we know that $\lim_{s \rightarrow 0} \Phi(s) = 0$ and $\lim_{s \rightarrow s^*} \Phi(s) = +\infty$. By the intermediate value theorem, there exists $s \in (0, s^*)$ so that $\Phi(s) = 1$, that is, $s = \mu(s)$. This s is unique since Φ is strictly increasing. $\square$

Finally, we establish the regularity about ξ , η and ζ .

Proposition 3.14. *Let (ξ, η, ζ) be the solutions to (3.60), then there exists A_n such that*

$$\begin{aligned}\|\xi^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \\ \|\eta^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \quad \|\zeta^{(n)} r^n\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} \leq A_n.\end{aligned}$$

with A_n depending on r_0, k, π and the pressure p .

Proof. From $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in Y_{m,k}$ and the compactness results in Proposition 3.8 we can get $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in L^2(0, r_0)$, $(\sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\eta', \sqrt{r}\zeta', \frac{\eta}{\sqrt{r}}, (\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r})\sqrt{r}) \in L^2(0, r_0)$. From the system (3.60), we can get

$$\begin{aligned}\|\xi'' r^{3/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C \left\| (\xi, \eta, \zeta, \sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\eta', \sqrt{r}\zeta', \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r}\right)\sqrt{r}) \right\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}, \\ \|\eta'' r^{3/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C \left\| \left(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\eta', \frac{\eta}{\sqrt{r}} \right) \right\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}, \\ \|\zeta'' r^2\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C \left\| (\eta, \zeta, \sqrt{r}\xi', \sqrt{r}\zeta', \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r}\right)\sqrt{r}) \right\|_{L^2(0, r_0)}.\end{aligned}$$

By induction on n . Suppose for some $n \geq 1$,

$$\begin{aligned}\|\xi^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \\ \|\eta^{(n)} r^{(2n-1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq A_n, \quad \|\zeta^{(n)} r^n\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} \leq A_n.\end{aligned}$$

By Remark 3.2 then differentiating (3.60), we get that there exists a constant C depending on the various parameters so that

$$\begin{aligned}\|\xi^{(n+1)} r^{(2n+1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C A_n \leq A_{n+1}, \\ \|\eta^{(n+1)} r^{(2n+1)/2}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C A_n \leq A_{n+1}, \\ \|\zeta^{(n+1)} r^{n+1}\|_{L^2(0, r_0)} &\leq C A_n \leq A_{n+1}.\end{aligned}$$

Then, the bound holds for $n+1$, and so by induction the bound holds for all $n \geq 1$. $\square$

4. Lower Bound of the Dissipation Rate $D_{m,k}$ in (2.33)

In this section, we will prove the lower bound of the dissipation rate $D_{m,k}$ defined in (2.33) and the existence of the biggest growing mode for any $(m, k) \in \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z}$. For notational simplicity, we use $o(1)$ and $O(1)$ to denote constants independent of k and m to be 1. First, we introduce the following lemma which will be used in the proof of Proposition 4.1

Lemma 4.1. For any function $(f_1, f_2, f_3) \in X_k$ or $Y_{m,k}$ (see (3.13) and (3.52)), there holds that for $i = 1, 2, 3$

$$f_i^2(r_0) \leq 2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |f_i'|^2 dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}}, \quad (4.1)$$

$$|f_i(r_0)| \leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} |f_i'|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} + O(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \rho |f_i|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}}. \quad (4.2)$$

Proof. We choose the smooth cutoff function $\Psi(r)$, satisfying $0 \leq \Psi(r) \leq 1$ for $r \in [\frac{r_0}{2}, r_0]$, $\Psi(r) = 0$ for $r \in [0, \frac{r_0}{2}]$ and $\Psi(r_0) = 1$. Then we can prove that for $i = 1, 2, 3$

$$\begin{aligned} f_i^2(r_0) &= 2 \int_0^{r_0} (\Psi f_i)(\Psi f_i)' dr \leq 2 \left(\int_0^{r_0} |\Psi f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_0^{r_0} |(\Psi f_i)'|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\ &\leq 2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |f_i'|^2 dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}}. \end{aligned}$$

For $0 < r_* < r_0$ we choose the smooth cutoff function $\Phi(r)$ with support in $(\frac{r_0}{2}, \frac{r_*+r_0}{2})$, satisfying $0 \leq \Phi(r) \leq 1$ for $r \in [\frac{r_0}{2}, \frac{r_*+r_0}{2}]$, $\Phi(r) = 0$ for $r \in [0, \frac{r_0}{2}] \cup [\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}, r_0]$ and $\Phi(r_*) = 1$. Then we can show that for $i = 1, 2, 3$

$$\begin{aligned} f_i^2(r_*) &= 2 \int_0^{r_*} (\Phi f_i)(\Phi f_i)' dr \leq 2 \left(\int_0^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} |\Phi f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_0^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} |(\Phi f_i)'|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\ &\leq 2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} |f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} |f_i'|^2 dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} |f_i|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\ &\lesssim \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} \rho |f_i|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} |f_i'|^2 r dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{\frac{r_*+r_0}{2}} \rho |f_i|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\ &\leq o(1) \int_0^{r_0} |f_i'|^2 r dr + O(1) \int_0^{r_0} \rho |f_i|^2 r dr. \end{aligned}$$

Hence, for $(r_0 - r_*)^{\frac{1}{2}} = o(1)$, we get

$$\begin{aligned} |f_i(r_0)| &\leq |f_i(r_0) - f_i(r_*)| + |f_i(r_*)| \\ &\lesssim \left(\int_{r_*}^{r_0} f_i'^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} (r_0 - r_*)^{\frac{1}{2}} + o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} |f_i'|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\ &\quad + O(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \rho |f_i|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\ &\leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} |f_i'|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} + O(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \rho |f_i|^2 r dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}}. \end{aligned}$$

□

Now, we establish the lower bound of the dissipation rate $D_{m,k}$ in (2.33).

Proposition 4.1. Assume that $0 \leq \rho \leq C$, $\mathcal{J} = \int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr = 1$, when $m = 0$, $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k$, and when $m \neq 0$, $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in Y_{m,k}$. Then for any $|m| \neq 1$ and $k \in \mathbb{Z}$,

$$D_{m,k} \gtrsim \|(\xi', \eta', \zeta')\sqrt{r}\|_{L^2} + k^2 + m^2 - O(1). \quad (4.3)$$

For $|m| = 1$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$,

$$\begin{aligned} D_{m,k} &\gtrsim \|(\xi', \eta', \zeta')\sqrt{r}\|_{L^2}^2 + k^2 + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr \\ &\quad + \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr - O(1). \end{aligned} \quad (4.4)$$

Proof. We can estimate the dissipation rate $D_{m,k}$ as that

$$\begin{aligned} D_{m,k} &\geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta + 2k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - \frac{2m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \varepsilon \int_0^{r_0} \left[\left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 + \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta \right)^2 \right] r dr \\ &\quad + \frac{2\pi^2}{3} \delta \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr \\ &\geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta \right)^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 & + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta \right)^2 r dr + 2\pi^2\varepsilon \int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi \right)^2 r dr \\
 & + \frac{2\pi^2}{3}\delta \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr,
 \end{aligned} \tag{4.5}$$

where we have used the facts that $a^2 + b^2 \geq \frac{1}{2}(a-b)^2$, with $a = -2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta$, $b = \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta$; $a = \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta + 2k\eta$, $b = \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta$; $a = \xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - \frac{2m}{r}\zeta - k\eta$, $b = \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta - k\eta$.

Now, we prove our result by the following three cases.

Case I: when $m = 0$, the estimate (4.3) holds.

From (4.5), we can get

$$\begin{aligned}
 D_{0,k} & \geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \\
 & + 2\pi^2\varepsilon \int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr \\
 & + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr.
 \end{aligned} \tag{4.6}$$

Since the minimizer $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k$, Definition 3.1 implies that $\xi(0) = 0$. From Proposition 3.1 we know that $\int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr$ and $\int_0^{r_0} \eta^2 dr$ are bounded, which shows that $(\eta r)' \in L^2(0, r_0)$. So, we get that ηr is well-defined at the origin $r = 0$. Therefore, the boundary term $\eta k \xi r|_{r=0} = 0$.

Then we can prove from integrating by parts that

$$\begin{aligned}
 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr & = \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta' k \xi r dr \\
 & = \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2\eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi' r dr - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi dr.
 \end{aligned} \tag{4.7}$$

Notice that

$$\begin{aligned}
 \left| -2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi' r dr \right| & \leq \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr, \\
 \left| -2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi dr \right| & \leq \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr.
 \end{aligned}$$

Then, we have

$$\begin{aligned}
 \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr & \geq \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} \\
 & \quad - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr - \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr - \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr,
 \end{aligned}$$

which gives that

$$\begin{aligned} \varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr &\geq \varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \\ &\quad + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} - O(1)D_{0,k}. \end{aligned} \quad (4.8)$$

On the other hand, since the minimizer $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in X_k$, Definition 3.1 implies that $\zeta(0) = 0$. Therefore, we get

$$\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr = \varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} \right) dr - \varepsilon \pi^2 \zeta^2|_{r=r_0}.$$

which combining (4.6) with (4.8), we deduce

$$\begin{aligned} O(1)D_{0,k} &\geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr \\ &\quad + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} \right) dr \\ &\quad + 4\varepsilon \pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} - 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \zeta^2|_{r=r_0}. \end{aligned}$$

The remaining thing is to deal with the boundary terms.

By (4.2) in Lemma 4.1 we get

$$|-2\varepsilon \pi^2 \zeta^2|_{r=r_0}| \leq o(1) \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr + O(1)\mathcal{J}. \quad (4.9)$$

Using (4.1) in Lemma 4.1 and Cauchy inequality, we have

$$\begin{aligned} &|4c\varepsilon \pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0}| \\ &\leq 8cr_0 k \varepsilon \pi^2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\eta|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\eta'|^2 dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\eta|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \\ &\quad \times \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \\ &\leq 8cr_0 \varepsilon \pi^2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |k\eta|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |k\xi|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\eta'|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \\ &\quad + 8cr_0 \varepsilon \pi^2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |k\eta|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi'|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \\ &\quad + 8cr_0 \varepsilon \pi^2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\eta|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |k\xi|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\eta'|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{4}} \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 & + 8cr_0\varepsilon\pi^2 \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |k\eta|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |\xi|^2 dr \right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \\
 & \leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \right) + O(1) \left(\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} |k\eta|^2 r dr + \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr \right) \\
 & \leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \right) + O(1) D_{0,k},
 \end{aligned} \tag{4.10}$$

where we have used the facts that for any function h and $k \neq 0$, it holds that

$$\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} h^2 dr \leq \frac{2}{r_0} \int_0^{r_0} k^2 h^2 r dr.$$

Then by the steady density $0 \leq \rho \leq C$ and $\mathcal{J} = \int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr = 1$, we can show that

$$\begin{aligned}
 O(1) D_{0,k} & \geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \\
 & \quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr \\
 & \quad + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{2\zeta^2}{r} \right) dr - O(1) \mathcal{J} \\
 & \geq \pi^2 \min(2\delta, \varepsilon) \int_0^{r_0} (\xi'^2 + \eta'^2 + \zeta'^2) r dr \\
 & \quad + \pi^2 \min\left(\frac{2\delta}{C}, \frac{\varepsilon}{C}\right) k^2 \int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr - O(1) \\
 & = \pi^2 \min(2\delta, \varepsilon) \int_0^{r_0} (\xi'^2 + \eta'^2 + \zeta'^2) r dr + \pi^2 \min\left(\frac{2\delta}{C}, \frac{\varepsilon}{C}\right) k^2 - O(1),
 \end{aligned}$$

which implies that (4.3) holds.

Case (II): when $|\mathbf{m}| = 1$, the estimate (4.4) holds.

From (4.5), we have

$$\begin{aligned}
 D_{m,k} & \geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr \\
 & \quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \right)^2 r dr + 2c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr \\
 & \quad + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\xi \right)^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \varepsilon \int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi \right)^2 r dr \\
 & \quad + \frac{2\pi^2}{3} \delta \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr,
 \end{aligned} \tag{4.11}$$

with small constant $c \leq 1$ (to be determined). When $|m| = 1$, using that $2(a^2 + b^2) \geq (a - mb)^2$ with $a = \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\zeta$ and $b = -\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi$, we can get that

$$D_{m,k} \geq \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr. \quad (4.12)$$

The term $\int_0^{r_0} (\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta)^2 r dr$ can be estimated as

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta\right)^2 r dr &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr - \int_0^{r_0} 2m\eta k(\zeta + m\xi) dr \\ &\quad + \int_0^{r_0} 2\eta(\eta' + k\xi) dr - \int_0^{r_0} 2\eta\eta' dr \\ &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr - \int_0^{r_0} 2m\eta k(\zeta + m\xi) dr \\ &\quad + \int_0^{r_0} 2\eta(\eta' + k\xi) dr - \eta^2|_{r=r_0} + \eta^2(0). \end{aligned}$$

Note that

$$\begin{aligned} \left| - \int_0^{r_0} 2m\eta k(\zeta + m\xi) dr \right| &\leq \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{(\zeta + m\xi)^2}{r} dr, \\ \left| \int_0^{r_0} 2\eta(\eta' + k\xi) dr \right| &\leq \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr. \end{aligned}$$

When $|m| = 1$, we have

$$\int_0^{r_0} \frac{(\zeta + m\xi)^2}{r} dr = \int_0^{r_0} \frac{(\xi + m\zeta)^2}{r} dr.$$

Then, we get

$$\begin{aligned} 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta\right)^2 r dr &\geq \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr \\ &\quad - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{(\zeta + m\xi)^2}{r} dr \\ &\quad - 4\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta^2|_{r=r_0}, \end{aligned}$$

which implies that

$$\begin{aligned} 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r}\eta - k\zeta\right)^2 r dr &\geq \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr \\ &\quad - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta^2|_{r=r_0} - O(1)D_{m,k}. \end{aligned} \quad (4.13)$$

We now estimate the term $c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr$. Since the minimizer $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in Y_{m,k}$, Definition 3.2 implies that $\xi(0) = 0$. From Proposition 3.8 we know that $\int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr$ and $\int_0^{r_0} \eta^2 dr$ are bounded, which gives that $(\eta r)' \in L^2(0, r_0)$. So we get

that ηr is well-defined at the origin $r = 0$. Therefore, we prove the boundary term $\eta k \xi r|_{r=0} = 0$. Similarly as (4.7), we have

$$\begin{aligned} c \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr &= c \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + c \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2c \int_0^{r_0} \eta' k \xi r dr \\ &= c \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + c \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2c \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} \\ &\quad - 2c \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi' r dr - 2c \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi dr. \end{aligned}$$

Notice that

$$\begin{aligned} \left| -2c \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi' r dr \right| &\leq c \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + c \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr, \\ \left| -2c \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi dr \right| &\leq 2c \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + \frac{c}{2} \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr. \end{aligned}$$

So we deduce

$$\begin{aligned} c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr &\geq c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \frac{c}{2}\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2c\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} \\ &\quad - c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr - c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 c \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr, \end{aligned}$$

which gives that

$$\begin{aligned} c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr &\geq c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \frac{c}{2}\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2c\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} \\ &\quad - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 c \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr - O(1)D_{m,k}. \end{aligned} \quad (4.14)$$

Choosing the constant c small enough such that $c \leq \frac{1}{8}$, by (4.11), (4.13) and (4.14), we can show that

$$\begin{aligned} O(1)D_{m,k} &\geq \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr \\ &\quad + c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\xi}{r} \right)^2 r dr - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta^2|_{r=r_0} \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + 4c\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0}. \end{aligned} \quad (4.15)$$

The remaining thing is to deal with the boundary terms.

By Lemma 4.1 and Cauchy inequality, similarly as (4.9) and (4.10), we can prove

$$| -2\varepsilon\pi^2\eta^2|_{r=r_0}| \leq o(1) \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + O(1)\mathcal{J},$$

$$|4c\varepsilon\pi^2\eta k\xi r|_{r=r_0}| \leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \right) + O(1)D_{m,k}.$$

Combining the above estimates with (4.12) and (4.15), by $0 \leq \rho \leq C$ and $\int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr = 1$, we have

$$\begin{aligned} O(1)D_{m,k} &\geq \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr + \frac{c}{2}\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \\ &\quad + c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr \\ &\geq c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \\ &\quad \times \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr + \frac{c}{2}\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \\ &\quad \times \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr \\ &\geq c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr \\ &\quad + \min \left(\frac{2\varepsilon\pi^2}{C}, \frac{c\varepsilon\pi^2}{2C}, \frac{2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta)}{C} \right) k^2 \int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr \\ &\quad + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr \\ &= c\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr \\ &\quad + \min \left(\frac{c\varepsilon\pi^2}{2C}, \frac{2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta)}{C} \right) k^2 + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{1}{r} \eta^2 dr \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right)^2 r dr, \end{aligned}$$

which gives that (4.4) holds

Case (III): when $|m| \geq 2$, the estimate (4.3) holds.

From (4.5), we can get

$$\begin{aligned}
 D_{m,k} \geq & 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr \\
 & + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \right)^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr \\
 & + 2\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\zeta \right)^2 r dr + 2c\varepsilon \pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi \right)^2 r dr \\
 & + \frac{2\pi^2}{3} \delta \int_0^{r_0} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr.
 \end{aligned} \tag{4.16}$$

We temporarily write $g = -\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi$, then we have $\xi = \frac{1}{m}(r\zeta' - \zeta + rg)$. Moreover, we get

$$\begin{aligned}
 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \right)^2 r dr &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m\xi\zeta}{r} dr \\
 &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta \left(g + \zeta' - \frac{\zeta}{r} \right) dr \\
 &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta \zeta' dr \\
 &\quad - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\zeta^2}{r} dr \\
 &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + \zeta^2(r_0), \\
 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \right)^2 r dr &= \frac{1}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \frac{(r\zeta' - \zeta + rg)^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 2}{r} \zeta^2 dr \\
 &\quad + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + \zeta^2(r_0) \\
 &= \frac{1}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + g^2 r + 2(r\zeta' - \zeta)g - 2\zeta\zeta' \right) dr \\
 &\quad + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + \zeta^2(r_0) \\
 &= \frac{1}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + g^2 r + 2(r\zeta' - \zeta) \right) dr \\
 &\quad + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + \left(1 - \frac{1}{m^2} \right) \zeta^2(r_0),
 \end{aligned}$$

which implies that

$$\begin{aligned} 2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \right)^2 r dr &= \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 4}{r} \zeta^2 dr \\ &\quad + \frac{1}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + g^2 r \right) dr + \frac{2}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \zeta' g r dr \\ &\quad - \frac{2}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + 4 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr + \left(2 - \frac{1}{m^2} \right) \zeta^2(r_0). \end{aligned}$$

Notice that

$$\begin{aligned} \left| \frac{2}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \zeta' g r dr \right| &\leq \frac{1}{2m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr + \frac{2}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} g^2 r dr, \\ \left| -\frac{2}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr \right| &\leq \frac{1}{2m^2} \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\zeta^2}{r} dr + \frac{2}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} g^2 r dr, \\ \left| 4 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta g dr \right| &\leq \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 \zeta^2}{r} dr + \frac{8}{m^2} \int_0^{r_0} g^2 r dr. \end{aligned}$$

Hence, we have

$$\begin{aligned} 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta \right)^2 r dr &\geq \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \frac{1}{2} \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr \\ &\quad + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 4}{r} \zeta^2 dr + \frac{1}{2m^2} \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} \right) dr \\ &\quad - \frac{11}{m^2} \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} g^2 r dr + \left(2 - \frac{1}{m^2} \right) \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \zeta^2(r_0). \end{aligned} \quad (4.17)$$

We can estimate the term $2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\zeta \right)^2 r dr$ as follows:

$$\begin{aligned} 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\zeta \right)^2 r dr &= 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr \\ &\quad - 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} 2m\eta k \zeta dr. \end{aligned}$$

Notice that

$$\left| -\int_0^{r_0} 2m\eta k \zeta dr \right| \leq \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr,$$

which implies that

$$\begin{aligned} 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\zeta \right)^2 r dr &\geq 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr \\ &\quad - O(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr \right). \end{aligned} \quad (4.18)$$

We now estimate the term $2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr$. Similarly as (4.7), we can get

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr &= \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 2\eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi' r dr \\ &\quad - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi dr. \end{aligned}$$

Note that

$$\begin{aligned} \left| -2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi' r dr \right| &\leq \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr, \\ \left| -2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta k \xi dr \right| &\leq \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr. \end{aligned}$$

Hence we have

$$\begin{aligned} 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\eta' + k\xi)^2 r dr &\geq 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 4\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} \\ &\quad - O(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr \right). \end{aligned} \quad (4.19)$$

On the other hand, since the minimizer $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in Y_{m,k}$, Definition 3.2 implies that $\xi(0) = \zeta(0) = 0$. Therefore, we get the boundary terms $m\zeta\xi|_{r=0} = \zeta^2|_{r=0} = 0$, which gives that

$$\begin{aligned} &\int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi \right)^2 r dr \\ &= \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + \frac{m^2 \xi^2}{r} \right) dr - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta' \zeta dr \\ &\quad - 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta' m \xi dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m \xi \zeta}{r} dr \\ &= \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + \frac{m^2 \xi^2}{r} \right) dr - \zeta^2(r_0) \\ &\quad - 2m\zeta\xi|_{r=r_0} + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta m \xi' dr + 2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m \xi \zeta}{r} dr. \end{aligned}$$

Since

$$\begin{aligned} \left| 2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta m \xi' dr \right| &\leq \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 \zeta^2}{r} dr, \\ \left| 2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m \xi \zeta}{r} dr \right| &\leq \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 \zeta^2}{r} dr, \end{aligned}$$

we can show that

$$\begin{aligned}
 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r}\xi \right)^2 r dr &\geq 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + \frac{m^2\xi^2}{r} \right) dr - 2\varepsilon\pi^2\zeta^2(r_0) \\
 &\quad - 4\varepsilon\pi^2 m\zeta\xi|_{r=r_0} - O(1) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr \\
 &\quad - O(1) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr - O(1) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2\zeta^2}{r} dr,
 \end{aligned}$$

which together with (4.16)–(4.19), gives that for $|m| \geq 2$

$$\begin{aligned}
 &O(1)D_{m,k} \\
 &\geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr \\
 &\quad + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{\xi^2}{r} dr + \frac{1}{2}\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr \\
 &\quad + \pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 - 4}{r} \zeta^2 dr + \frac{\pi^2}{2m^2} \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} \right) dr \\
 &\quad + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \eta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr \\
 &\quad + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr + 4\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0} - 4\varepsilon\pi^2 m\zeta\xi|_{r=r_0} \\
 &\quad + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left(\zeta'^2 r + \frac{\zeta^2}{r} + \frac{m^2\xi^2}{r} \right) dr - 2\varepsilon\pi^2\zeta^2(r_0). \tag{4.20}
 \end{aligned}$$

The remaining thing is to deal with the boundary terms $4\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0}$, $-4\varepsilon\pi^2 m\zeta\xi|_{r=r_0}$ and $2\varepsilon\pi^2\zeta^2(r_0)$. Similarly as (4.10), by Cauchy inequality and (4.1) in Lemma 4.1, it follows from (4.16) and (4.17) that

$$\begin{aligned}
 |4\varepsilon\pi^2 \eta k \xi r|_{r=r_0}| &\leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \right) + O(1)D_{m,k}, \\
 |4\varepsilon\pi^2 m\zeta\xi|_{r=r_0}| &\leq o(1) \left(\int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr + \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2\xi^2}{r} dr \right) + O(1)D_{m,k},
 \end{aligned}$$

where we have used the facts that for any function h and $|m| \geq 2$, it holds that

$$\int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} h^2 dr \leq r_0 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 h^2}{r} dr, \quad \int_{\frac{r_0}{2}}^{r_0} h^2 dr \leq \frac{2}{r_0} \int_0^{r_0} h^2 r dr.$$

By (4.2) in Lemma 4.1 the same estimate in (4.9), implies that

$$|-2\varepsilon\pi^2\zeta^2|_{r=r_0}| \leq o(1) \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr + O(1)\mathcal{I}.$$

Then it follows from (4.20), $0 \leq \rho \leq C$ and $\int_0^{r_0} \rho(\xi^2 + \eta^2 + \zeta^2) r dr = 1$ that

$$\begin{aligned} O(1)D_{m,k} &\geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr - O(1)\mathcal{J} \\ &\quad + 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \eta^2 r dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \zeta^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} k^2 \xi^2 r dr \\ &\quad + \frac{1}{2}\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \zeta^2 dr + 2\varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2}{r} \eta^2 dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 \xi^2}{r} dr \\ &\geq 2\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta) \int_0^{r_0} \xi'^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \eta'^2 r dr + \varepsilon\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \zeta'^2 r dr - O(1) \\ &\quad + \min\left(\frac{2\pi^2 \delta}{C}, \frac{\pi^2 \varepsilon}{C}\right) k^2 + \frac{\pi^2 \min(\varepsilon, \delta)}{2r_0^2 C} m^2, \end{aligned}$$

which implies that (4.3) holds. Therefore, the result is proved from case (I), case (II) and case (III). $\square$

Next, we show the existence of the biggest growing mode for any m and k .

Proposition 4.2. *There exists the biggest growing mode μ for any $(m, k) \in \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z}$.*

Proof. The proof is divided into the following steps.

Step 1: Assume that when $m = 0$, $\inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1} E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta) < 0$, and when $m \neq 0$, $\inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2} E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r; s_{m,k}) < 0$ for any fixed large k , any fixed m and small enough $s_{m,k}$.

Step 2: By Propositions 3.3 and 3.9 then a minimizer exists, which ensures that, for any fixed m and k , we can define the function $\lambda : (0, \infty) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ by

$$\begin{aligned} \lambda(0, k) &:= \inf_{(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1} E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta; s_k), \quad \text{when } m = 0, \\ \lambda(m, k) &:= \inf_{((\xi, \eta, \zeta), \widehat{Q}_r) \in \mathcal{A}_2} E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r; s_{m,k}), \quad \text{when } m \neq 0. \end{aligned}$$

Step 3: Let $\lambda(m, k) = -\mu^2(m, k)$ for any m and k , then from Steps 1 and 2, we get $\mu(m, k) > 0$ for any fixed m and k . By Propositions 3.6 and 3.13 it holds that there exists a unique $s_{m,k}$ such that $\mu(m, k) = \sqrt{-\lambda(m, k)} = s_{m,k}$, for any fixed m and k .

Step 4: We will use a contradiction to show that

$$\mu(m, k) = s_{m,k} \rightarrow 0, \quad \text{as } m \rightarrow \infty \quad \text{or} \quad k \rightarrow \infty. \quad (4.21)$$

Suppose

$$\limsup_{\substack{m \rightarrow \infty \\ \text{or} \\ k \rightarrow \infty}} s_{m,k} > 0. \quad (4.22)$$

It is convenient to decompose $E_{m,k}$ according to that when $m = 0$,

$$E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta; s_k) = \tilde{E}_{0,k}^0 + \tilde{E}_{0,k}^1 + \tilde{E}_{0,k}^2 = \tilde{E}_{0,k}^0 + \tilde{E}_{0,k}^1 + s_{0,k}D_{0,k},$$

with

$$\begin{aligned}\tilde{E}_{0,k}^0 &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} \left[\frac{2p'}{r} + \frac{4\gamma p B_\theta^2}{r^2(\gamma p + B_\theta^2)} \right] \xi^2 r dr, \\ \tilde{E}_{0,k}^1 &= 2\pi^2 \int_0^{r_0} (\gamma p + B_\theta^2) \left[k\eta - \frac{1}{r} \left((r\xi)' - \frac{2B_\theta^2}{\gamma p + B_\theta^2} \xi \right) \right]^2 r dr,\end{aligned}$$

and when $m \neq 0$,

Similarly as (4.5), we can get that for any $(\xi, \eta, \zeta) \in \mathcal{A}_1$,

By Lemma 3.6 choosing $0 < r_1 < \frac{r_0}{3}$ small enough such that $Cr_1 \leq \frac{1}{4}$, similarly as (3.30), we deduce

which together with Step 1 gives that for any m and k , $|\tilde{E}_{m,k}^0| \leq C(\mathcal{J}) + C$. Since $E_{0,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta; s_{0,k}) < 0$ and $E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \hat{Q}_r; s_{m,k}) < 0$, and for any m and k , it holds that $\tilde{E}_{m,k}^1 \geq 0$, we get that $0 \leq s_{m,k} D_{m,k} \leq C_0 + C$ for any m and k , which gives that

$$s_{m,k} \leq \frac{C_0 + C}{D_{m,k}},$$

for any m and k . Hence, we can get from Proposition 4.1 that when $|m| \neq 1$, $s_{m,k} \leq \frac{C_0 + C}{\|(\xi', \eta', \zeta')\sqrt{r}\|_{L^2}^2 + k^2 + m^2 - O(1)}$, and when $|m| = 1$, $s_{m,k} \leq \frac{C_0 + C}{\|(\xi', \eta', \zeta')\sqrt{r}\|_{L^2}^2 + k^2 - O(1)}$. This shows that

$$\limsup_{m \rightarrow \infty \text{ or } k \rightarrow \infty} s_{m,k} = 0,$$

which contradict with (4.22). This ensures (4.21). The existence of growing mode $s_{m,k} > 0$ requires that m and k are finite. By Propositions 3.3 and 3.9 for any fixed m and k , the corresponding energy achieves its negative infimum with a growing mode, therefore, we can choose the biggest growing mode for these finitely many m and k . This proves the result. $\square$

5. Growth of Solutions to the Linearized Problem

In this section, we will prove estimates for the growth in time of arbitrary solutions to (3.10) in terms of the biggest growing mode Λ for any m and k . In fact, from Proposition 4.2 we know that there exists the biggest growing mode for any m and k , so we can define the biggest growing mode as follows:

$$\Lambda^2 := \sup_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} (-\lambda_{m,k}). \quad (5.1)$$

5.1. Estimates about ξ , η and ζ

In this subsection, let us introduce the following two lemmas describing the basic estimates about ξ , η and ζ .

Lemma 5.1. Assume (ξ, η, ζ) is the H^2 solution of the system

$$\begin{aligned} & \frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_1^2 + \frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|(\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta))\|_2^2 ds \\ & \leq \frac{2N_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_1^2 + \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_2^2. \end{aligned} \quad (5.22)$$

Therefore,

$$\begin{aligned} & \frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_1^2 + \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_2^2 \\ & \leq -\frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|(\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta))\|_2^2 ds + \frac{2N_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_1^2 + 2\|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_2^2, \end{aligned} \quad (5.23)$$

which together with (5.17) gives that

$$\begin{aligned} & \frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_1^2 + \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_2^2 \\ & \leq -\frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|(\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta))\|_2^2 ds + \frac{2N_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_1^2 \\ & \quad + 2\|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)(0)\|_2^2 + \frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)\|_2^2 ds + 2\Lambda \int_0^t \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_2^2 ds \\ & = \frac{2N_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_1^2 + 2\|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)(0)\|_2^2 + 2\Lambda \int_0^t \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)\|_2^2 ds \\ & \leq e^{2\Lambda t} \left(2\Lambda \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)(0)\|_1^2 + \frac{2N_0}{\Lambda} + 2\|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)(0)\|_2^2 \right). \end{aligned} \quad (5.24)$$

From the definitions of N_0 in (5.14), it follows that

$$\begin{aligned} N_0 & \leq C(\|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)(0)\|_1^2 + \|(\xi_t, \eta_t, \zeta_t)(0)\|_2^2 \\ & \quad + \|\partial_{tt}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)(0)\|_1^2 + \|\widehat{Q}_{rt}(0)\|_{H^1}^2), \end{aligned} \quad (5.25)$$

which implies the result. $\square$

5.3. Exponential growth about original notation g

In this subsection, we will prove the exponential growth about solution g . First, let us introduce the basic estimates about the solution g .

Lemma 5.3. Assume g is a H^2 solution to the system (2.14) with the corresponding jump and boundary conditions, then we can get

& + \nabla \cdot g(g^* \cdot \nabla p)]dx + \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}|^2 dx + \|\sqrt{\rho}g_t\|_{L^2}^2 \\
& = \int_{\Omega} [|Q_0|^2 + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g_0|^2]dx + \int_{\Omega} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g_0^* \times Q_0) \\
& \quad + \nabla \cdot g_0(g_0^* \cdot \nabla p)]dx + \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}_0|^2 dx + \|\sqrt{\rho}g_{0t}\|_{L^2}^2,
\end{aligned} \tag{5.26}$$

with $Q = \nabla \times (g \times B)$.

Proof. Taking the time derivation about the system (2.14)₂, then multiplying the resulted equation by g_t , similarly as the proof of Lemma 3.1 we can show

\frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \|\sqrt{\rho}g_t\|_{L^2}^2 & = -\frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}|^2 dx - \frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \int_{\Omega} [|Q|^2 + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g|^2]dx \\
& \quad - \frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \int_{\Omega} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g^* \times Q) + \nabla \cdot g(g^* \cdot \nabla p)]dx \\
& \quad - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\varepsilon |\nabla g_t + \nabla g_t^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I}|^2 + 2\delta |\operatorname{div} g_t|^2 \right] dx.
\end{aligned}$$

Integrating the above equality about time, we have (5.26). $\square$

Lemma 5.4. Assume g is a H^2 solution to the system (2.14) with the corresponding jump and boundary conditions, we can get

\frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \|\sqrt{\rho}g_{tt}\|_{L^2}^2 & = -\frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}_t|^2 dx - \frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \int_{\Omega} [|Q_t|^2 + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g_t|^2]dx \\
& \quad - \frac{1}{2} \frac{d}{dt} \int_{\Omega} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g_t^* \times Q_t) + \nabla \cdot g_t(g_t^* \cdot \nabla p)]dx \\
& \quad - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\varepsilon |\nabla g_{tt} + \nabla g_{tt}^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_{tt} \mathbb{I}|^2 + 2\delta |\operatorname{div} g_{tt}|^2 \right] dx,
\end{aligned} \tag{5.27}$$

with $Q_t = \nabla \times (g_t \times B)$.

Proof. Taking the time derivation about the system (2.14)₂, then multiplying the resulted equation by g_{tt} , similarly as the proof of Lemma 3.1 we can show that (5.27) holds. $\square$

Lemma 5.5. Assume that $\|g\|_1$ and $\|g\|_2$ are bounded with their definitions in (2.30)–(2.31), and assume g is a H^2 solution to the system (2.14), we can get

 & \leq \Lambda^2 \|\sqrt{\rho}g\|_{L^2}^2 + \Lambda \int_{\Omega} \left[\frac{\varepsilon}{2} |\nabla g + \nabla g^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g \mathbb{I}|^2 + \delta |\operatorname{div} g|^2 \right] dx,
 \end{aligned} \tag{5.28}$$

with $Q = \nabla \times (g \times B)$.

 \widehat{Q}_\theta(r, \theta, z) &= \sum_{m,k \in Z} \mathcal{F}\widehat{Q}_\theta(r, m, k) e^{im\theta + ikz}, \\
 \widehat{Q}_z(r, \theta, z) &= \sum_{m,k \in Z} \mathcal{F}\widehat{Q}_z(r, m, k) e^{im\theta + ikz}.

Define the energy $\mathcal{E}$ and the dissipation term D as follows:

Inserting the above Fourier expansions of $g_r(r, \theta, z)$, $g_\theta(r, \theta, z)$, $g_z(r, \theta, z)$, $\widehat{Q}_r(r, \theta, z)$, $\widehat{Q}_\theta(r, \theta, z)$ and $\widehat{Q}_z(r, \theta, z)$ into the above energy $\mathcal{E}$ and dissipation term D , we have

with $E_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta, \widehat{Q}_r)$ defined in (2.27) when $m \neq 0$ and defined in (2.26) when $m = 0$, and $D_{m,k}(\xi, \eta, \zeta)$ defined in (2.33).

In fact, in cylindrical coordinates, we know that

$$(g^* \cdot \nabla p)(\nabla \cdot g) = g_r p' \left(\frac{1}{r} (r g_r)' + \frac{\partial_\theta g_\theta}{r} + \partial_z g_z \right), \quad (5.31)$$

$$\nabla g = \begin{pmatrix} \partial_r g_r & \partial_r g_\theta & \partial_r g_z \\ \frac{\partial_\theta g_r}{r} - \frac{g_\theta}{r} & \frac{\partial_\theta g_\theta}{r} + \frac{g_r}{r} & \frac{\partial_\theta g_z}{r} \\ \partial_z g_r & \partial_z g_\theta & \partial_z g_z \end{pmatrix}, \quad (5.32)$$

$$\operatorname{div} g \mathbb{I} = \begin{pmatrix} \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{\partial_\theta g_\theta}{r} & 0 & 0 \\ + \partial_z g_z & & \\ 0 & \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{\partial_\theta g_\theta}{r} & 0 \\ + \partial_z g_z & & \\ 0 & 0 & \xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{\partial_\theta g_\theta}{r} \\ + \partial_z g_z & & \end{pmatrix}. \quad (5.33)$$

Inserting the Fourier expansions about g_r , g_θ and g_z into (5.29)–(5.33), we can get

$$-\left(B'_\theta + \frac{B_\theta}{r}\right) \sum_{m,k \in Z} \mathcal{F}g_\theta^* \sum_{m,k \in Z} \frac{im\mathcal{F}g_r B_\theta}{r}, \quad (5.35)$$

$$(g^* \cdot \nabla p)(\nabla \cdot g) = \sum_{m,k \in Z} \mathcal{F}g_r p' \sum_{m,k \in Z} \left(\frac{1}{r}(r\mathcal{F}g_r)' + \frac{im\mathcal{F}g_\theta}{r} + ik\mathcal{F}g_z \right), \quad (5.36)$$

$$\nabla g = \sum_{m,k \in Z} e^{im\theta + ikz} \begin{pmatrix} \mathcal{F}\partial_r g_r & \mathcal{F}\partial_r g_\theta & \mathcal{F}\partial_r g_z \\ \frac{im\mathcal{F}g_r}{r} - \frac{\mathcal{F}g_\theta}{r} & \frac{im\mathcal{F}g_\theta}{r} + \frac{\mathcal{F}g_r}{r} & \frac{im\mathcal{F}g_z}{r} \\ ik\mathcal{F}g_r & ik\mathcal{F}g_\theta & ik\mathcal{F}g_z \end{pmatrix}, \quad (5.37)$$

$$\operatorname{div} g \mathbb{I} = \sum_{m,k \in Z} e^{im\theta + ikz} \begin{pmatrix} a & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & a & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & a \end{pmatrix}, \quad (5.38)$$

with $a = \mathcal{F}\xi' + \frac{\mathcal{F}\xi}{r} + \frac{im\mathcal{F}g_\theta}{r} + ik\mathcal{F}g_z$.

On the other hand,

$$\nabla \cdot \hat{Q} = \hat{Q}'_r + \frac{\hat{Q}_r}{r} + \frac{\partial_\theta \hat{Q}_\theta}{r} + \partial_z \hat{Q}_z = 0, \quad (5.39)$$

Inserting (5.34)–(5.38) into the energy E and dissipation term D , and at the same time, letting

Here we have used the facts that ξ , η and ζ are real-valued functions.

From Proposition 4.2 we know that there exists the biggest growing mode for any $(m, k) \in \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z}$. Denoting the biggest growing mode as Λ , which can be found in (5.1), then we get that

$$\begin{aligned} & - \int_{\overline{\Omega}} [|Q|^2 + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g|^2] dx - \int_{\overline{\Omega}} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g^* \times Q) + \nabla \cdot g(g^* \cdot \nabla p)] dx \\ & - \int_{\overline{\Omega}^v} |\widehat{Q}|^2 dx \\ & = -4\pi^2 \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \int_0^{r_0} \left\{ (m^2 + k^2r^2) \left[\frac{B_\theta}{r} \eta + \frac{-kB_\theta(r\xi)' + 2kB_\theta\xi}{m^2 + k^2r^2} \right]^2 \right. \\ & \quad \left. + \gamma p \left[\frac{1}{r} (r\xi)' - k\eta + \frac{m\zeta}{r} \right]^2 \right\} r dr \\ & - 4\pi^2 \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \int_0^{r_0} \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r(m^2 + k^2r^2)} (\xi - r\xi')^2 dr \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 & -2\pi L \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \int_0^{r_0} \left[2p' + \frac{m^2 B_\theta^2}{r} \right] \xi^2 dr - 4\pi^2 \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \int_{r_0}^{r_w} g \\
 & \times \left[|\widehat{Q}_r|^2 + \frac{1}{m^2 + k^2 r^2} |(r\widehat{Q}_r)'|^2 \right] r dr \\
 & \leq 4\Lambda^2 \pi^2 \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \int_0^{r_0} \rho(|\xi|^2 + |\eta|^2 + |\zeta|^2) r dr + 4\Lambda \pi^2 \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \\
 & \times \int_0^{r_0} \varepsilon \left[\frac{2}{9} \left(-2\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' - \frac{2\xi}{r} - \frac{2m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 \right. \\
 & + \frac{2}{9} \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta + 2k\eta \right)^2 + \left(-\zeta' + \frac{\zeta}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \xi \right)^2 + (\eta' + k\xi)^2 \\
 & \left. + \left(\frac{m}{r} \eta - k\zeta \right)^2 \right] r dr + 4\Lambda \pi^2 \sum_{m,k \in \mathbb{Z}} \int_0^{r_0} \delta \left(\xi' + \frac{\xi}{r} + \frac{m}{r} \zeta - k\eta \right)^2 r dr \\
 & = \Lambda^2 \|\sqrt{\rho}g\|_{L^2}^2 + \Lambda \int_{\Omega} \left[\frac{\varepsilon}{2} |\nabla g + \nabla g^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g \mathbb{I}|^2 + \delta |\operatorname{div} g|^2 \right] dx. \quad \square
 \end{aligned}$$

Similar to the proof of Theorem 5.1 by Lemmas 5.4 and 5.5, we can get the following result.

Theorem 5.2. Assume g is a H^2 solution to the system (2.14) with the corresponding boundary conditions, then it holds that

 & \leq Ce^{2\Lambda t} (\|g_t(0)\|_1^2 + \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \|\partial_{tt}g(0)\|_1^2 + \|\widehat{Q}_t(0)\|_{L^2}^2). \quad (5.46)
 \end{aligned}$$

Proof. Integrating (5.27) of Lemma 5.4 about time over $[0, t]$, we have

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \frac{1}{2} \|\sqrt{\rho}g_{tt}\|_{L^2}^2 = L_0 - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}_t|^2 dx - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} [|Q_t|^2 + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g_t|^2] dx \\
 & - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g_t^* \times Q_t) + \nabla \cdot g_t (g_t^* \cdot \nabla p)] dx \\
 & - \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} \left[\frac{\varepsilon}{2} \left| \nabla g_{tt} + \nabla g_{tt}^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_{tt} \mathbb{I} \right|^2 + \delta \left| \operatorname{div} g_{tt} \right|^2 \right] dx ds, \quad (5.47)
 \end{aligned}$$

with

$$\begin{aligned}
 L_0 & = \frac{1}{2} \|\sqrt{\rho}g_{tt}(0)\|_{L^2}^2 + \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}_t|^2(0) dx + \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} [|Q_t|^2(0) + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g_t|^2(0)] dx \\
 & + \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g_t^* \times Q_t)(0) + \nabla \cdot g_t (g_t^* \cdot \nabla p)(0)] dx. \quad (5.48)
 \end{aligned}$$

Using Lemma 5.5 we deduce

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \frac{1}{2} \|\sqrt{\rho} g_{tt}\|_{L^2}^2 + \int_0^t \int_{\Omega} \left[\frac{\varepsilon}{2} |\nabla g_{tt} + \nabla g_{tt}^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_{tt} \mathbb{I}|^2 + \delta |\operatorname{div} g_{tt}|^2 \right] dx ds \\
 &= L_0 - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega^v} |\widehat{Q}_t|^2 dx - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} [|Q_t|^2 + \gamma p |\nabla \cdot g_t|^2] dx \\
 &\quad - \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} [(\nabla \times B) \cdot (g_t^* \times Q_t) + \nabla \cdot g_t (g_t^* \cdot \nabla p)] dx \\
 &\leq L_0 + \frac{\Lambda^2}{2} \|\sqrt{\rho} g_t\|_{L^2}^2 + \frac{\Lambda}{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\frac{\varepsilon}{2} |\nabla g_t + \nabla g_t^T - \frac{2}{3} \operatorname{div} g_t \mathbb{I}|^2 + \delta |\operatorname{div} g_t|^2 \right] dx.
 \end{aligned} \tag{5.49}$$

Using the definitions of the norms $\|\cdot\|_1$ and $\|\cdot\|_2$ given by (2.30)–(2.31) in the introduction, we obtain

$$\frac{1}{2} \|\partial_{tt} g\|_1^2 + \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt} g\|_2^2 ds \leq L_0 + \frac{\Lambda^2}{2} \|g_t\|_1^2 + \frac{\Lambda}{2} \|g_t\|_2^2. \tag{5.50}$$

Integrating in time and using Cauchy's inequality, we get

$$\begin{aligned}
 \Lambda \|g_t\|_2^2 &= \Lambda \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \Lambda \int_0^t 2 \langle g_t, \partial_{tt} g \rangle_2 ds \\
 &\leq \Lambda \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt} g\|_2^2 ds + \Lambda^2 \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds,
 \end{aligned} \tag{5.51}$$

$$\Lambda \partial_t \|g_t\|_1^2 = 2\Lambda \langle \partial_{tt} g, \partial_t g \rangle_1 \leq \Lambda^2 \|g_t\|_1^2 + \|\partial_{tt} g\|_1^2. \tag{5.52}$$

Combining estimates (5.50)–(5.52), we obtain

$$\begin{aligned}
 \partial_t \|g_t\|_1^2 + \|g_t\|_2^2 &\leq \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt} g\|_2^2 ds + \Lambda \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 \\
 &\quad + \frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt} g\|_1^2 - \frac{1}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt} g\|_2^2 ds \\
 &\leq \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 + \|g_t\|_2^2 + \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \Lambda \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 \\
 &\quad - \frac{1}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt} g\|_2^2 ds \\
 &\leq \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + 2\|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + 2\Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 + 2\Lambda \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds,
 \end{aligned} \tag{5.53}$$

where we have used the facts

$$\|g_t\|_2^2 \leq \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \frac{1}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt} g\|_2^2 ds + \Lambda \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds. \tag{5.54}$$

It follows from the Gronwall's inequality that

$$\|g_t\|_1^2 + \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds \leq e^{2\Lambda t} \|g_t(0)\|_1^2 + \left(\frac{L_0}{\Lambda^2} + \frac{\|g_t(0)\|_2^2}{\Lambda} \right) (e^{2\Lambda t} - 1). \quad (5.55)$$

From (5.50), it follows that

$$\frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt}g\|_1^2 + \frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt}g\|_2^2 ds \leq \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 + \|g_t\|_2^2. \quad (5.56)$$

Therefore,

$$\frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt}g\|_1^2 + \|g_t\|_2^2 \leq -\frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt}g\|_2^2 ds + \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 + 2\|g_t\|_2^2, \quad (5.57)$$

which together with (5.51) gives that

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{1}{\Lambda} \|\partial_{tt}g\|_1^2 + \|g_t\|_2^2 &\leq -\frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt}g\|_2^2 ds + \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 + 2\|g_t(0)\|_2^2 \\ &\quad + \frac{2}{\Lambda} \int_0^t \|\partial_{tt}g\|_2^2 ds + 2\Lambda \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds \\ &= \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + \Lambda \|g_t\|_1^2 + 2\|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + 2\Lambda \int_0^t \|g_t\|_2^2 ds \\ &\leq e^{2\Lambda t} (2\Lambda \|g_t(0)\|_1^2 + \frac{2L_0}{\Lambda} + 2\|g_t(0)\|_2^2). \end{aligned} \quad (5.58)$$

From the definition of L_0 in (5.48), we can get

$$L_0 \leq C(\|g_t(0)\|_1^2 + \|g_t(0)\|_2^2 + \|\partial_{tt}g(0)\|_1^2 + \|\widehat{Q}_t(0)\|_{L^2}^2), \quad (5.59)$$

which implies the result. $\square$

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
